Life Together at Trinity

Attentiveness: God In Each Moment

A few years ago, when I was asked, "How does your spirituality impact your vocation?" I responded, "I think my vocation impacts my spirituality more than my spirituality impacts my vocation." What I meant was that I often experience God more in the practice of ministry with God's people than I do in, say, two

hours of centering prayer by myself. Several weeks later, during a clergy retreat, we were asked to complete a "spiritual inventory" of about 60 questions. The results of the inventory bore out my own self-assessment: That my spirituality is "extroverted" and is fed by interaction with others.

To some of you, this may come as no surprise. But it is not that simple. As I am writing this reflection, I am on spiritual retreat with the monks of the Society of St. John the Evangelist. Our day consists of Morning Prayer at 7:30 a.m., followed by breakfast. Eucharist at noon, followed by dinner. Evening Prayer at 6:00 p.m. followed by a light supper. Compline or Night Prayer at 8 p.m. In between worship and meals there is silence. Yes, silence. Many would think this would

drive me crazy. But I love it. And I need it.

A healthy spiritual life requires a balance of activity and silence; maybe call it the giving and receiving of grace. Our own personal practices may be weighted more in one direction than the other, but we all require some combination of the two. The American theologian and mystic Thomas Merton wrote that "every life can be dedicated to some extent to contemplation, and even the most active of lives can and should be balanced by a contemplative element ..." He warned that "action would be purposeless if it did not spring from authentic being that contemplation fosters. Without contemplation, people would have nothing to give others but their own obsessions and prejudices."

In our overly-busy lives, it is so easy to not make space for time with God – which is all that "prayer" is. It doesn't need words, it doesn't need a lot of planning, it doesn't need solitude or seclusion. For when all is said and done, contemplation or prayer is really simply *attentiveness* – being attentive to the presence of God in every moment of every day. Seventeenth century Carmelite Brother Lawrence discovered he could talk to the God of pots and pans as he cooked and washed dishes in the monastery kitchen.

Now, in Epiphanytide, it is not too late to add one more resolution for the new year. Let us each resolve, wherever we are or whatever we are doing, to be attentive to the presence of God in each moment. Blessed New Year.

Sunday Morning Adult Christian Formation

Following the presentation, Fr. Tom will answer questions and provide additional information.

Choirs To Sing Evensong at St. John's, Trinity

The Choir School of Hartford and the Trinity Choir will offer two services of Choral Evensong in the coming weeks. The first of these will take place at St. John's Episcopal Church, 679 Farmington Avenue in West Hartford, on Sunday, January 28. The 5:00 p.m. service will include a setting of the evening canticles, the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis, written by Bert Landman, Trinity's former Precentor, along with John Rutter's setting of "The Lord is my shepherd." Jack Merrill, our Director of Music Ministries, will conduct: Scott Lamlein, Music Director at St. John's, will be the organist for this service.

Our choirs will return to Trinity to sing Evensong on Sunday,

February 18, the First Sunday in Lent. This service will also begin at 5:00 p.m., and will include William Byrd's *Second Service* setting of the canticles as well as Haydn's motet "Insanae et vanae curae."

Don't miss the chance to hear our choirs sing for these two services of Evensong, a long-cherished tradition in the Episcopal Church.

CVSO To Present "London Calling"

The Connecticut Valley Symphony Orchestra will present "London Calling," a program of orchestral works first performed in London, as the next concert in its 2017-2018 series at Trinity Church on Sunday, February 4. The 3:00 p.m. program will feature a performance of Ralph Vaughan Williams' The Lark Ascending, a piece inspired by a poem by the English poet George Meredith about the song of the skylark. Violinist Gary Capozziello, a member of the Hartford Symphony Orchestra and a doctoral candidate at The Hartt School, will be the soloist.

The afternoon's program will include a second work inspired by the work of an English poet, William Walton's "Crown Imperial March"; the march's title comes from William Dunbar's poem "In Honour of the City of London." (You may remember Jack Merrill's spirited performance of an organ arrangement of this piece on Christ the King Sunday last November.) The orchestra will also perform the beautiful "Largo" from Handel's opera Xerxes, which was commissioned by the King's Theatre, London, where it was first performed, as well as excerpts from English composer Gustav Holst's The Planets, which had its first complete performance at the Oueen's Hall in London.

Tickets will be available at the door for \$15.00 (\$12.00 for students and seniors). As is usual for CVSO concerts, children under 12 will be admitted free. A reception will follow the performance.

Ash Wednesday Services

Ash Wednesday 2018 falls on February 14, marking the official beginning of the forty days of Lent. The service schedule for Ash Wednesday is as follows:

7:30 a.m. Holy Eucharist with sermon

12:00 p.m. Holy Eucharist with sermon and hymns

7:30 p.m. Holy Eucharist with sermon, hymns and choir

The Rev. George Chien will preach, and the imposition of ashes will be available at all three services.

Our Ash Wednesday offering will again support the Diocese of Jerusalem. Bishop Suhail Dewani has asked that this donation be designated for summer camp programs run by the Diocese. Gifts can be received anytime during Lent; watch the weekly bulletins for updates.

Wednesday Evening Lenten Program for 2018

We invite you to recharge your faith this Lent. Join your Trinity family for friendship, fellowship and food each Wednesday evening in Lent from 5:45-7:15 p.m. After a light meal which will begin at 5:45 p.m. each week, there will be a talk about some aspect of Jesus and our relationship with Him. The talk will be followed by small group discussion and a time of closing prayer.

Here are the topics for each night of this year's program:

February 21 – Who is Jesus?

February 28 – Why did Jesus live, die and rise?

March 7 – How can I develop and deepen my personal faith?

March 14 – How can I grow deeper in prayer?

March 21 – How do we hear the voice of Jesus, the Good Shepherd, speaking to us?

April 4 (Post-Easter bonus session) – Following Jesus in the Episcopal faith family; a look at aspects of our life that are the same as, and different from, other Christian communities

Wherever you are in your faith journey, you are invited to be a part of this year's Lenten program. If you are seeking, you can find help in getting answers to some of your questions. If you have doubts, this will be a safe place to talk about them. If you have been an active Christian for a long time, you are invited to renew and rediscover your faith. Invite a friend to join you; the Church grows when friends invite their friends to "come and see" Jesus in our community of faith.

An Explanation of the Aumbry Candle

It has long been the custom of the Church to set aside a small portion of the consecrated bread and wine for emergency use in ministering to the sick or dying. This "Reserved Sacrament," as it is called, is usually DID YOU KNOW! stored in one of two places – in a Tabernacle (a cupboard built into the front center of the altar upon which the cross is usually placed), or in an Aumbry (a cupboard built into the wall of the sanctuary, close to the altar). Trinity Church has an Aumbry built into the wall above the credence shelf at the right front of the Chapel.

It is the custom to have a candle burning (symbolic of the Light of Christ and evidencing the spiritual presence of Christ in the reserved sacrament) above the Tabernacle or Aumbry whenever the sacrament is present. Our Sanctuary lamp utilizes a seven day candle. Each week, as the candle is exchanged for a new one, the "Light" is also transferred.

An opportunity exists for the Aumbry candle in the Trinity Church chapel to be given as a memorial to a loved one or as a thank offering for a donation of \$5 per week. If you would like to offer the candle, please contact Pam Haddad at 860-527-8133, Ext. 204 or send her an email at phaddad@trinityhartford.org. The name(s) of those being remembered or the person/event for which thanksgiving is being offered will be listed in the Sunday bulletin.

Parish Retreat February 16-18: Lenten Reflections

Join Fr. Don and parishioners from Trinity, Collinsville; Grace, Hartford; St. James', Glastonbury; and St. Mary's, Manchester, at

The three brief retreat presentations will be based on the book *Holy Solitude*: *Lenten reflections with Saints, Hermits, Prophets, and Rebels*, by Heidi Haverkamp. The book offers a variety of ways to enter into conversation with God, even for those who find meditation difficult. There will be plenty of time to walk the spacious grounds, read, reflect and relax.

Those attending may also participate in the daily rhythm of worship consisting of Morning Prayer, Eucharist, Evening Prayer and Compline.

The cost of \$190 (\$130 for those who participated in 2017) includes all meals and a private room. Scholarship assistance is available; please speak to Fr. Don.

If you would like to attend this year's retreat, please sign up with Fr. Don no later than February 1; you can also contact him for more information on this event.


Capital Campaign for Mission Update

As we near the end of the so-called "silent phase" of our capital campaign, our clergy and lay leadership are making great progress in building the foundation for a successful campaign. Since November, we have achieved the following:

- 1. Completed an update of the 2014 Feasibility Study conducted by Partners for Sacred Places. This involved interviewing once again about a dozen or so of the 45 individuals who were interviewed for the study back in 2014 in order to assure that assumptions based upon that study are still valid. Thanks to Cathy Rowe for coordinating with the PSP staff to arrange these interviews!
- 2. Contracted with Northeast Collaborative Architects of Middletown, CT, and Newport, RI, as our architectural consultants. By the middle of February, they will have completed (weather cooperating!) interviewing a series of nine focus groups regarding our building usage. The focus groups will include any parishioners who want to participate. They will meet following worship on a Sunday in February to be announced.
- 3. Fr. Don and the PSP consultants have completed the so-called "pyramid of gifts" which charts a pathway to achieving the financial goals of the campaign.
- 4. A schedule of personal interviews by PSP staff for

- prospective Campaign Steering Committee members has been arranged for January 29-30, with the first meeting of the Committee set for Thursday evening, February 15.
- 5. A team consisting of Warden Alan Rice, former warden Mark MacGougan and parish archivist Liz Kirkpatrick has held two meetings and come up with a working draft of a "case statement" which will be sent to all prospective donors to the Campaign. It will be modified following the architectural study and given a final edit by PSP staff prior to going out.

We ask your prayers for the success of this Campaign as we seed to raise "venture capital" for projects that will increase Trinity's efforts to further God's mission in and around the Hartford region in the coming decades.

Don and Wardens Alan Rice and Martha Freimuth are delighted to announce that an anonymous group of parishioners has made a challenge to the Trinity congregation in response to the sermon offered on Sunday, January 14, by the Wardens: They will match every new pledge for 2018 we receive going forward, or any new increase of an existing pledge, up to a total of \$10,000. We pray that many of you will hop on this opportunity to double the impact of a new or increased pledge for 2018. A huge THANK YOU to the anonymous parishioners who have made this special challenge possible.

Here's the current state of our 2017 Annual Appeal. As of the deadline for this issue of *The Voice*, we had received a total of 82 pledges for 2018 totaling \$298,508. Of those 82 households, 18 pledged the same amount as in 2017, 15 decreased their pledges from 2017 (these pledges totaled \$30,134 -a decrease of \$9,471); 31 increased their pledges (for a total of \$159,474 - up \$12,526 from 2017); and there were 18 new pledges totaling \$36,844. That's good news – but that pledge total isn't enough to balance the expenses we will incur this year if we are to keep Trinity Church the vibrant place we all value so much.

Now that we as a congregation have committed to a sustainable annual draw on our endowment, the participation of each and every member of our congregation in supporting our parish's financial needs is more important than ever. With the pledge challenge currently on the table, now's the time to

make sure you have turned in a pledge for 2018 that represents your commitment to support our parish financially to the best of your ability.

If you have not yet turned in a pledge of your expected level of giving for 2018, please do so right away. We are still waiting to hear from 27 households that made a pledge in 2017 but have not yet done so for 2018. If you would like to consider increasing a pledge you have already made for the current year, now's the time!



Estimate of Giving packets are available on the nametag table in Goodwin Hall, and completed pledge cards can be either placed in the offering plate on Sunday or mailed to the church office. If you would like to modify a pledge you have already made for 2018, please call the church office at 860-527-8133, send in a check with a cover letter, or submit a new pledge card marked "Revised." Help Trinity meet its 2018 budget with the extra boost provided by the \$10,000 pledge challenge.

Also, if you were not able to complete your pledge for 2017 by last December 31, it is not too late to do so. In each year's budget, the Vestry creates a "Prior Year Pledges" category to accommodate payments of pledges for past years. We hope that you will consider completing your 2017 pledge if you have not already done so.

Avery Ensemble To Perform Music from World War I Era

Introducing Hartford Seminary Peacemaker Amy Langston

Hartford Seminary's 2017-18 class of International Peacemaking Program fellows includes nine students, four from the U.S. and five from other countries. Trinity Church has been host to several IPP fellows in past years, and this year Peacemaker Amy Langston has chosen Trinity as her home parish during her two-year master's degree program. In addition to weekly worship, Amy looks forward to opportunities for participating in preaching and adult education.

Q. Tell us about your educational background.

A. In May, I completed my B.A. in religion with a criminology minor from Meredith College in Raleigh, North Carolina.

O. How did you learn about Hartford Seminary's International Peacemaking Program?

A. I was accepted to Hartford Seminary for the Master of Arts in Religious Studies. I knew about the IPP through communication with the Seminary and alums, but it was the Seminary that reached out and offered me a place in this program.

Q. Why are you interested in learning about peacemaking?

A. Peace has long been an important tenet of the Christian tradition. In recent months, I've become more aware of the theology of peace embraced by specific Christian thinkers, and that has prompted me to explore how I could incorporate that necessary ideal in my future work. I want to learn constructive methods of addressing the tensions, animosity and violence of our times, and develop a solid, practical theology of peacemaking.

Q. How do you hope to use your skills after a year of training as a peacemaker?

A. I am hoping to work in community efforts that break down barriers and increase cooperation and compromise. I would like to give others the tools to continue peacemaking efforts and empower them to become peacemakers themselves. I am waiting to see where God might call me to be.

Q. Tell us a little about the interreligious conflict you see in the United States.

A. While the greatest strength of the United States is diversity, we can't deny that racism, sexism, homophobia, Islamophobia, and anti-Semitism are alive. We are drowning in our fear and paranoia, which is impeding our growth. I am especially bothered by the recent trends of insularity and walling ourselves off from the world. Global cooperation is imperative for the world to continue flourishing.

Q. Give us a quick description of your home life.

A. I was born and raised around Raleigh, and remained there for my undergraduate degree. My parents still live there and my older sister lives nearby. I'm blessed to have parents who have supported me every step of the way. I grew up in the Presbyterian Church, and am hoping to make an eventual transition into the Quaker path.

Q. Hartford Seminary is using the phrase "We Were Built for This Time" to address the deep divisions in our country and across the world. What does that mean to you?

A. In my college sociology classes, we learned about the concept of the "beloved community," which to me is a microcosm of God's vision for the world: people from all backgrounds, faiths, and ways of life, learning how to navigate life together. I believe that at Hartford Seminary, we are seeking to fulfill this vision, especially as we see our faiths lived out in everyday life. God's people have always been builders, and as we build the beloved community here, we take pieces from here to build that foundation elsewhere and watch it thrive.

Q. What led you to choose Trinity as your home parish in Hartford?

A. When I first visited Trinity I felt welcomed immediately, not only by the people, but by the space, which spoke to me as one where the Spirit was alive and which was filled with the love and hospitality of Christ. Every week I was greeted by someone new, and I witnessed a parish that strives to care for each other. I wanted to be in a church that reflects the diversity of Christ's Body, and that's what I found at Trinity. I knew this was what I wanted to be a part of, and I'm excited to see how I can make a difference during my two years here.
