Life Together

Almighty God, on this day you opened the way of eternal life to every race and nation by the promised gift of your Holy Spirit: Shed abroad this gift throughout the world by the preaching of the Gospel, that it may reach to the ends of the earth; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen. (A Collect for Pentecost, *BCP* page 227).



Pentecost is often called "The Birthday of the Church" because it brings Eastertide to a close: Jesus has arisen and has appeared to his followers and has ascended into heaven. Then there is this 10-day hiatus during which the disciples are presumably wondering what to do and wondering when this mysterious "Spirit" that Jesus promised will arrive. And then, suddenly, BAM, it arrives, as we read in that marvelous passage from the second chapter of the Acts of the Apostles.

In a real sense, we may consider the Pentecost event as signaling a new "nativity" and a new "resurrection." A new nativity in the sense that it gives birth to a new understanding of the world, a new creation, a new movement of God's people – the "Jesus Movement." A new "resurrection" in the sense that just as Jesus rose from the dead, Jesus' followers now begin to rise from their own darkness, receiving new life and finally beginning to grasp, through the gift of the Holy Spirit, what Jesus had been trying to get through their thick heads and into their hearts.

As with all of the Christian holidays, we do not observe Pentecost as though the Holy Spirit is just now arriving. Rather, we mark this day as an occasion to remember the events of that first Pentecost, how they affected Jesus' followers, and what that means for us, Jesus' latter-day followers.

The challenge for us, it seems to me, is to explore how we can recapture the excitement with which those first-century disciples were transformed into apostles. They were ordinary men and women who, inspired by the Holy Spirit, took on for themselves the life and teachings of Jesus and modeled a new way of living for themselves and for the world. No longer were they bound by the old customs that served their ancestors so well.

The Holy Spirit didn't make just that one appearance on that first Pentecost. As Jesus promised, that gift is available to us each and every moment if we are attentive to it. We are far from sharing that message "to the ends of the earth." We can start in our own communities and in particular in our Asylum Hill Community. In this coming season after Pentecost, to what new thing might God be calling you?

Election, By-Law Revision, Capital Campaign Highlight Annual Meeting June 3

Trinity's Annual Meeting will take place on Sunday, June 3, as part of the 9:30 a.m. service, the one



service, the one service that will held at Trinity that day. The sermon time will feature the Rector's

Annual Report to the Congregation.

As has become our custom, following the Prayer after Communion, we will take a short break for worshippers to pick up refreshments in Goodwin Hall before returning to the church for the business portion of our meeting – remembering that the "business" part of church operations is also a part of the sacred work we are all called to share.

At the business meeting, we will thank those whose Vestry terms are coming to a close, elect new atlarge members and re-elect current officers and a representative to Diocesan Convention. See the accompanying article on page 4 for the Nominating Committee slate.

We will also consider a by-law change reducing the number of atlarge members of the Vestry to nine from the current twelve over the next three years. The Vestry has already approved this change at its March meeting. Trinity presently has an unusually large Vestry of 18, including officers and the Rector. The proposed change would reduce the total number to 15.

Guests at the meeting will include Ray Giolitto and Sean Donadio, architects with Northeast Collaborative Architects, who will make a presentation on what they heard from the focus groups they held with the congregation along with their recommendations for what to include in the upcoming capital campaign. This will be an important opportunity for the congregation to provide the architects and our elected leadership with feedback. (Please see the related detailed article on Page 3.)

As the meeting completes its business, we will close our worship with a concluding hymn, and a blessing and dismissal from the clergy. Please be sure to attend this important gathering in the life of our congregation.

Capital Campaign Update: Mark Your Calendar for June 3

In preparation for the kickoff of our Capital Campaign for Mission in September, Ray Giolitto and Sean Donadio of Northeast Collaborative Architects have completed their listening sessions with various focus groups of Trinity parishioners, as well as with key stakeholders in The Choir School of Hartford and members of the Asylum Hill community. Their task: To make recommendations that will address the concerns - present and future – of the people for whom our buildings provide space for worship, programs for music and the arts, education, support programs and gathering space for other purposes.

As is almost always the case in capital campaigns, the list of possibilities comes with a price tag far beyond, in the words of the Prayer Book, "what we can ask or imagine." We expected that. Our work now is to take the information provided to us and pick and choose among those items those that make the most sense within the parameters of our anticipated budget.

On Sunday, June 3, as a part of our Annual Meeting, Ray and Sean will be present to make a more formal presentation and respond to any questions. This is a village-wide project, and to get the broadest input, we hope everyone will plan on being present to participate in the conversation.

In a congregation with more than 30 different ministries, including a Day School and a Choir School, all housed in a building that's more than 120 years old, there are myriad issues relating to the physical plant and program which we must consider as we look to our task of build a strong foundation for the future. Please plan on attending the Annual Meeting and being a part of the opportunity to be in on the ground floor of our capital campaign.

Fill a Backpack for a Hartford Child

Trinity's annual back-to-school backpack project, which helps Hartford area children whose families cannot afford basic school supplies, begins on July 29.

To participate, pick up a list of supplies for the age group of your choice from the display in the Baptistery. Buy the supplies on the list, pack them all into the backpack, and then return the completed kit to the parish office during the week, or leave it in the Baptistery on Sunday morning. (If you find the cost of filling a backpack is too high, you are welcome to team up with another Trinity member to split the cost.) Be sure to mark your backpack with the age group for which it's intended, and whether it's meant for a boy or a girl.

Hartford schools open on August 28 this year. All kits need to be turned in by August 19 so our Covenant to Care social worker will have time to get the backpacks to the children who need them before classes start.

Asylum Hill Neighborhood Association News - Spring 2018

Police Report: Asylum Hills Community Service Officer Sid Palmieri has been issuing tickets for loitering. With each ticket he gives a service card that outlines where services, shelter and meals are available. He is working with security guards at schools to help the students get to know him and to build trust, concentrating his initial efforts on Hartford High and Jumoke Academy. He warned that warmer weather brings a rise in burglaries, and reminded everyone to close and lock doors and windows, and to remove objects from sight inside cars. The city has begun a crackdown on illegal riding of ATVs; arrest records show that most riders are from outside Hartford. The South Marshall Street area is hiring security staff for their neighborhood in conjunction with the neighborhood vigilance program.

Police Chief Rosado spoke to AHNA about his plans for the police force. He has a three-pronged initiative:

- 1. Improve staffing a new class of cadets has just graduated and two more classes will be available before the end of 2019.
- 2. Continue to improve technology the use of cameras and gunshot sound detectors has decreased police response time across the city.
- 3. Facilitate having the Community Response Unit work with the person on the street, the individual making a complaint, and to respond to neighborhood issues.

Fire Department: Jesus Lopez (860-757-4523 - Special Services unit) announced several initiatives including a car seat clinic, free smoke detectors and a Fire and Safety Program in the public schools. He shared statistics for the month of March.

Voices from the Neighborhood:

- 1. Residents are encouraged to donate food to the little food pantry at 202 Laurel Street, which works on the same premise as a free library: Take food if you need it and donate if you are able.
- 2. Volunteers are needed to read to/with students at West Middle School.
- 3. Street lights out? Call 311.
- 4. South Park Inn is now managing Plimpton House at 847 Asylum Avenue, a facility which houses 35 homeless males.
- 5. The Hartford Public Library branch at West Middle is closed due to budget constraints. AHNA needs to help get the word out that the neighborhood needs the library to re-open.
- 6. June 26 is the date for the 2018 South Marshall Street Block Party.

- 1. Potholes? Call 311.
- 2. Trader Joe's is opening a distribution center in Bloomfield jobs are available.
- 3. Interested in a clean up for your neighborhood? Knox will provide the necessary materials.

I-84: There are ongoing advisory meetings planned for the summer and fall. Right now discussions are centered around the moving of the train/bus station and the closing of certain highway ramps and redesigning of others. For a 3-D image of the project visit www.i84hartford.com.

Notes from the March and April Meetings of the Vestry

March Meeting

The Vestry met on March 20, with opening devotions by Richard Syracuse on the topic of gratitude.

The minutes of the February meeting were approved. Treasurer Janet Wilkinson reported that the congregation has responded very positively to the Pledge Challenge offered in January, and we are now operating on a balanced budget for 2018. In addition, one of the trusts of which Trinity is a beneficiary has contributed more than previously expected, allowing us to adjust our budget to reduce the draw on our endowment and to provide small raises for the office staff for the first time in three years.

The Vestry approved revising our bylaws to reduce the number of atlarge positions to three per year. This reduction will more accurately reflect the size of our church membership. The change will be presented to the congregation for final approval at the annual meeting on June 3, and will be effective in 2019. (See separate Annual Meeting article on Page 2.)

Outreach Quadrant liaison Lily Miller reported that the Kateri Mission in which Fr. Tom Furrer participates would like to have volunteers go along on a mission trip to Nigeria. Scholarship funds to help with the cost of the trip are available from the diocese.

The Property Team reported that electric hand dryers will be installed in the bathrooms off Goodwin Hall. The team also reported that planning and work is underway to convert the Tower Room to a nursery; the floor requires small repairs to make it safe for young children. This will free Room 1 in the Education Wing to be used as classroom space when Trinity Academy adds Grade 1 in September.

The Vestry discussed purchasing a Book of Remembrance to record memorial gifts. When memorial gifts are used to purchase needed items, the items would be recorded, along with the name of the person in whose memory the gift was given.

April Meeting

Vestry met again on April 17. Opening devotions were led by Kevin Chick, using the order for Evening Prayer in the Book of Common Prayer.

The minutes of the March meeting were approved.

The Nominating Committee report was received and approved. (See separate article on Page 4.)

The Property Team announced plans for an April 28 outdoor workday. One focus of the work will be cleaning up the weed growth in the labyrinth. A small local publishing company has asked permission to include our labyrinth in a photograph book. Vestry also discussed possible ways to improve our signage, especially on Farmington Avenue. The sandwich board being used currently is too small to read from passing cars.

The Wardens reported that The Choir School of Hartford is in the midst of a three-session workshop to consider how to expand the Choir School outside Trinity's walls, as was always the intent of the School. The Rector's report included the announcement of the annual Vestry Retreat to be held at Camp Washington on September 28-29. New Vestry members have all made a commitment to attend the retreat. Fr. Don also reported that Jo-Ann Sadosky has resigned as liaison for the Parish Care Ministry Quadrant after three years of service, and that Anne Rapkin has agreed to take Jo-Ann's place as liaison.

Fr. Don also reported that our Thursday noon Eucharists have been attended by a small group each week. Christ Church Cathedral and Grace Episcopal Church also offer midweek services, and all three churches are planning to begin to advertise these services in a single advertising format so that people looking for mid-week Episcopal services in the city can find them all listed together in one place.

Fr. Don announced that our Seminarian, Ben Wyatt, will be ordained to the transitional diaconate in his home diocese in Tennessee, and that Ben hopes to return to Trinity next year as he completes work at Yale on his Master of Sacred Theology degree.

The final item of the Rector's report was an update on the Capital Campaign, including an announcement that the Capital Campaign Steering Committee has now met twice and has named Drew Smith as co-chair of the campaign. The preliminary architecture proposals will be presented to Fr. Don and members of the vestry and the Steering Committee very soon.
