

THE FIRST READING 1 SAMUEL 3:1-20

Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the Lord under Eli. The word of the Lord was rare in those days; visions were not widespread.

At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was. Then the Lord called, "Samuel! Samuel!" and he said, "Here I am!" and ran to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call; lie down again." So he went and lay down. The Lord called again, "Samuel!" Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call, my son; lie down again." Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord, and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. The Lord called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." Then Eli perceived that the Lord was calling the boy. Therefore Eli said to Samuel, "Go, lie down; and if he calls you, you shall say, 'Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening." So Samuel went and lay down in his place.

Now the Lord came and stood there, calling as before, "Samuel! Samuel!" And Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening." [Then the Lord said to Samuel, "See, I am about to do something in Israel that will make both ears of anyone who hears of it tingle. On that day I will fulfill against Eli all that I have spoken concerning his house, from beginning to end. For I have told him that I am about to punish his house forever, for the iniquity that he knew, because his sons were blaspheming God, and he did not restrain them. Therefore I swear to the house of Eli that the iniquity of Eli's house shall not be expiated by sacrifice or offering forever."

Samuel lay there until morning; then he opened the doors of the house of the Lord. Samuel was afraid to tell the vision to Eli. But Eli called Samuel and said, "Samuel, my son." He said, "Here I am." Eli said, "What was it that he told you? Do not hide it from me. May God do so to you and more also, if you hide anything from me of all that he told you." So Samuel told him everything and hid nothing from him. Then he said, "It is the Lord; let him do what seems good to him."

As Samuel grew up, the Lord was with him and let none of his words fall to the ground. And all Israel from Dan to Beer-sheba knew that Samuel was a trustworthy prophet of the Lord.]

SECOND READING

1 Corinthians 6:12-20

"All things are lawful for me," but not all things are beneficial. "All things are lawful for me," but I will not be dominated by anything. "Food is meant for the stomach and the stomach for food," and God will destroy both one and the other. The body is meant not for fornication but for the Lord, and the Lord for the body. And God raised the Lord and will also raise us by his power. Do you not know that your bodies are members of Christ? Should I therefore take the members of Christ and make them members of a prostitute? Never! Do you not know that whoever is united to a prostitute becomes one body with her? For it is said, "The two shall be one flesh." But anyone united to the Lord becomes one spirit with him. Shun fornication! Every sin that a person commits is outside the body; but the fornicator sins against the body itself. Or do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God, and that you are not your own? For you were bought with a price; therefore glorify God in your body.

Our new livestream set-up is officially installed! For many months we have eagerly anticipated the arrival of a PTZ (pan-tilt-zoom) camera and a long-term system configuration to livestream our worship services more cohesively and with high audio/video quality. Starting Sunday, January 17th, our worship services will be livestreamed directly to YouTube to ensure the highest quality as well as most inclusive access. What can you expect? Here's some answers:

Where do I go to attend worship?

Starting January 17th, you attend worship by clicking a link that will be emailed to your earlier in the week. Alternatively, you can just go to www.YouTube.com and search "Trinity Episcopal Hartford" in the search bar at the top of the page to find our channel. From there, you'll be able to access all our videos - current and past.

How do I participate?

After worship: Please join us for a Zoom coffee hour and additional programming (Adult Formation discussions, etc.)

During worship: You can write in the live chat. (Screenshot attached)

Lay leadership: You can contribute readings either by filming yourself and sending it in during the week or by Zooming with Barbara Roos, our office administrator, who can record your reading on a Zoom call.

Musical Leadership: There will continue to be opportunities for virtual choir projects. Additionally, we will have a rotating cantor schedule, consisting of choristers and other singers from our community, who would rehearse with Michelle during the week and then show up in person on Sunday morning to help lead hymns during the livestream.

Why YouTube?

Accessibility and quality. Unlike Zoom, which requires downloading a separate application, attending a worship service on YouTube only requires a single click. YouTube also offers the highest quality streaming for audio and video, in comparison with Zoom and Facebook Live - without glitches, hiss, feedback, graininess, distortion, delay, etc. Our hope is that without these distractions, your experience of worship will be as spiritually-enriching as possible.

What happens behind the scenes?

Throughout the week, we will be curating video submissions (for readings, prayers, virtual choir videos, etc.). We will also be creating weekly templates for the livestream, which include presets for camera angles, text slides (for congregational responses and hymn lyrics), and embedded announcements. In addition to our usual Zoom sessions / rehearsals with our choral ensembles, music will be prepared and rehearsed individually each week with 1-2 cantors, with attention to sound system levels. Barbara will continue to create bulletin leaflets for reference. On Sunday morning, there will be 4-5 people present in the sanctuary, all at a safe distance. The Sunday morning crew will be: Dee, Michelle, a tech master, and 1-2 cantors. The tech master will be responsible for switching between camera feeds and positions, monitoring audio levels, cycling through on-screen text, and embedding prerecorded videos when applicable.

How do I interact with content throughout the week? And why should I?

Our visibility on social media platforms in dependent on how much people interact with it. The more engagement our videos receive, the more the internet algorithms promote them to others. On Facebook, you can help by following the Trinity Episcopal Church Facebook page, liking our videos, commenting on them, and sharing them on your own Facebook wall, if you're inspired to do so. On YouTube, you can also like, subscribe, comment, and share our videos.

On email platforms, you can copy video links and send them to other people. Were you moved by an anthem we did? Did you find meaning in a particular sermon? Share it!






Forward Day by Day





Trinity Book Group

Trinity's Book Group has chosen a nonfiction work for its January meeting: Black Hole Blues and Other Songs from Outer Space. The author, astrophysicist Janna Levin, is described as "a storyteller of uncommon enchantment... who harmonizes science and life with remarkable virtuosity" by the New York Times Book Review. The book recounts the story of the scientists who, in 2015, recorded the first sounds from space, caused by the collision of two black holes. Black Hole Blues is available on Amazon and bookstores.
