MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

TRINITY SUNDAY, JUNE 3, 2018

- I. Opening Prayer was led by The Rev. Dr. Frank G. Kirkpatrick. The Rev. Dr. Donald L. Hamer, Rector, called the meeting to order at 11:27 a.m.
- II. Approval of Minutes of Annual Meeting of 11 June 2017: A motion was made by Casey Rousseau and seconded by The Rev. George A. Chien to amend Agenda Item 9: New Business, to include an Amendment to Bylaws ARTICLES 3 and 4, concerning the total number of at-large Vestry members. Fr. Don explained the genesis of this change (from 12 at-large members to 9). The motion to amend Agenda Item 9 was approved unanimously at 11: 30 a.m. Elizabeth Kirkpatrick made a motion, seconded by Linda MacGougan, that the Annual Meeting Minutes of 11 June 2017 be accepted. Motion passed unanimously at 11:33 a.m.
- III. Canonical Requirements Concerning Eligibility to Vote: Rector explained that members present had to be at least sixteen years old and be supporting the church financially in order to vote at this meeting. It was noted that 39 parishioners were in attendance, meeting a quorum of 10% of the voting members of this parish (376 members).

IV. Reports:

- 1. Wardens: Alan gave special thanks to the lay leadership of the church for their help in making this a successful year.
- 2. Treasurer: Janet Wilkinson spoke about unexpected income from trust fund accounts. She thanked everyone who had increased their pledges, which resulted in our exceeding the challenge, thus enabling us to go on in better financial shape. Janet asked that we remember this parish in our prayers. She stated that the withdrawal of funds from the endowment had been reduced thanks to the additional pledges and trust fund income. Janet asked if anyone had questions. There were none.
- 3. Rector: Fr. Don spoke about The Choir School of Hartford and thanked Jackson Merrill, Director of Music Ministries, who in turn thanked Trinity for welcoming him. Jackson mentioned the successful Pilgrimage Tour of July 2017, which was a joint venture with former Director of Music Ministries, Bert Landman.
- 4. Choir School of Hartford: Jackson announced that Enid Oberholtzer will be stepping down as chair of The Choir School. Jackson thanked Enid profusely as did the Assembly with much applause. Jackson went on to state that new choristers have joined The Choir School from the ranks of Trinity Academy. Also, he said that he is still working out the details regarding collaboration with Emanuel Lutheran Church, Hartford, Connecticut. The next meeting of the board of trustees of The Choir School will be held on 5 June 2018. Jackson suggested that anyone who had questions

should contact him via e-mail. The annual report for The Choir School is included in the Annual Report for Trinity Episcopal Church. Lastly, Jackson revealed that future Evensong services may be reconfigured.

Fr. Don stated that he, Ernestine Weaver, the new Head of the Board of Trustees for The Choir School and Jackson Merrill are discussing ideas for the future, drawing upon Enid's time in office.

- 5. Recognition of Outgoing Vestry Members: Fr. Don recognized and thanked the following outgoing vestry members for their service: Claire Blissett, Timothy Watt (out of town today) and Jacob Troiano. Gifts were presented to Claire and Jacob, as they were celebrated with applause.
- 6. Report of the Nominating Committee and Election: The Nominating Committee's full report is found in the Annual Report for May 2018-May 2019. The slate of nominees, each to serve a three-year term: Robin D'Oyen, Walton Brown-Foster, William Kofalk and Stephen Sirotko. Kevin Rennie was nominated to serve for one year. The new Nominating Committee members are James Bradley, Elizabeth Kirkpatrick and Marshall Weaver.
 - The following officers have been nominated to serve a new term on the Vestry: Martha Freimuth, J. Alan Rice, Janet Wilkinson, Kathleen ("Kitty") J. Peterson and Kenneth ("Casey") Rousseau. Tom Oberholtzer moved that the entire slate of vestry nominees be voted upon, Ann Green seconded. Motion passed unanimously.
- 7. Swearing in of Vestry Officers and New Vestry Members: Attorney Lily Miller administered the oaths to Martha Freimuth, J. Alan Rice (Wardens); Kathleen ("Kitty") J. Peterson (Clerk); Janet Wilkinson (Treasurer); Kenneth ("Casey") Rousseau (Assistant Treasurer); Walton Brown-Foster, Robin D'Oyen, William Kofalk, Stephen Sirotko and Kevin Rennie, at-large members.
- 8. Feedback: Questions, joys, concerns of Members at this Annual Meeting were expressed. In response to a question, Fr. Don explained that Deacon Ben Wyatt would be part-time curate from July 2018-May 2019, since we have only one full-time clergy. Appreciation was expressed for non-stipendiary clergy: Bishop Andrew Smith, The Rev. Frank Kirkpatrick, The Rev. George Chien and The Rev. Tom Furrer.
- 9. New Business: Correction to Agenda Item 9: Amendment to Bylaws ARTICLES 3 AND 4: The Rev. George Chien made a motion, duly seconded by Tom Oberholtzer, to accept the amendment to the Bylaws ARTICLES 3 AND 4. Motion was approved unanimously by the Assembly at 11:58 a.m.

9a. New Business: Presentation by Northeast Collaborative Architects: Architects Sean Donadio and Raymond Giolitto spoke to the Assembly about NCA's process, which includes the use of focus groups from Trinity, architects spending time physically looking over and creating multiple drawings of the church campus, asking lots of questions, discerning what is important to those who use this space and how best to make necessary improvements (e.g. electrical, structural, safety-related) in keeping with the goals of the Capital Campaign ("The Campaign for Trinity Church"). The Assembly asked lots of

questions, which Sean and Ray answered. Barbara "Boo" Morton (Property Committee Liaison) added that there was overlap in the form of items, now in NCA's budget, that had been deferred for several years from the Property Committee's budget. Sean and Ray said that NCA's full report is not yet finalized.

- 10. Setting the Date for the 2019 Annual Meeting: Neill Derick made a motion, seconded by Barbara ("Boo") Morton, to hold next year's meeting on Trinity Sunday (16 June 2019). This will coincide with Father's Day. Motion was approved unanimously.
- 11. Other Business: None
- 12. Adjournment: Motion to adjourn moved by Percy Williamson, seconded by Martha Freimuth at 12:30 p.m.
- 13. Closing Hymn: The Assembly sang hymn #780 from the 1981 Hymnal
- 14. Blessing was delivered by Bishop Andrew Smith

ASSISTANT RECTOR'S REPORT HIGHLIGHTS: TRINITY FACTS AND FIGURES

1. Vital Statistics:

- a. Total membership is **up** by 16 members from 2017 to 2018.
- b. Average Sunday attendance is **down** by 16 members from 2017 to 2018.
- c. Easter attendance is **up** by 12 members from 2017 to 2018.
- d. Average Sunday attendance for 2019, so far, is **down** about 5-10% from 2018 figures. A drop of this size is expected when there is a rector transition, and we should expect it to recover when a new rector is in place.
- e. Pledge participation is up 13% from 2017 to 2018.
- f. Clergy performed 4 baptisms, 4 confirmations, 1 marriage, and 7 funerals in 2018.
- g. Outreach ministries, including Trinity Academy, served approximately **542** members of the local community on a monthly basis.

2. Major events in the life of the parish:

- a. Fr. Don retired on March 3, 2019.
- b. Pam Haddad, our parish administrator for the last 15 years, left her position to pursue a new opportunity on December 14, 2018.
- c. We successfully kicked off the Capital Campaign for Trinity, with a private launch in Fall 2018 and a public launch in the Spring of 2019.
- d. The office welcomed Barbara Roos, first as our capital campaign coordinator, and then as our new parish administrator.
- e. The church welcomed the Saeedi family from Afghanistan and assisted in their resettlement.
- f. The church welcomed Anne Rapkin, Amy Langston, and Allison Merrill to the pulpit, further expanding Trinity's deep and talented set of preachers.

3. What's next for Trinity?

- a. Continued ministry in the Asylum Hill neighborhood and greater Hartford area.
- b. Continued welcome to all, especially the poor, the weak, and the stranger. Just one month ago, Trinity welcomed the first Spanish-speaking women's AA group to our campus to begin meeting!
- c. The Capital Works Committee has begun to select repair and improvement projects for capital campaign funds.
- d. The church continues to await an interim rector assignment from ECCT. Once an interim rector is assigned, the search process for a permanent rector will kick into full gear. The church is also actively searching for a new capital campaign administrator now that Barbara Roos has taken on parish administration duties.

WARDENS' REPORT 2018-2019

The work of the Vestry over the past year has focused on energy, finances, community involvement, and the retirement of Fr. Don Hamer.

Over the spring and summer of 2018, discussions were renewed with JK Energy Solutions, agent for Eversource, about a major upgrade to the lighting and HVAC in the parish house and Goodwin Hall. Under a program called Energy Advantage, Eversource would give Trinity a four-year, interest-free loan to replace incandescent lights with LED bulbs, and to replace the old window air conditioners with energy-efficient ductless units. The total amount of the loan was approximately \$95,000. However, the energy savings of approximately \$10,000 per year would reduce the net cost of the loan to about \$56,000. Moreover, the high efficiency and long life of the LED lamps mean that the church will continue to reap substantial savings on our utilities. The upgrades were completed in January.

The Capital Campaign for Trinity got underway. The goal is to raise \$750,000 to fund muchneeded repairs and upgrades to our aging campus including the building exterior, lighting in the sanctuary, security, paving, and myriad other projects. As of April 2019, roughly 60% of the goal had been pledged.

As was the case last year, the congregation's per-unit pledges continue to increase but unfortunately the actual number of pledges continues to fall. Thus, real pledge income continues to decline. Thanks to a generous grant from the Episcopal Church in Connecticut and an unexpected increase in Trinity's annual income from the Woodward Trust, our financial situation is secure for the time being. Bequests have increased the size of the endowment, which has been steadily shrinking over the past decade. For the third year in a row, Trinity has been able to balance its budget. But the core of a self-sustaining parish is its members' commitment to stewardship, and Trinity needs continued vigilance in restraining our expenditures and in encouraging generous giving from all our members.

A central part of Trinity's spiritual life is its involvement in the Hartford community and beyond. Shared services with St. Monica's and with Grace Lutheran have continued, as has the musical collaboration between Emanuel Lutheran on Capitol Avenue and our choirs and choristers. Trinity is also involved with the South Marshall Street Project and the Asylum Hill Neighborhood Association. The outreach committee has been particularly active in many ministries, including the settlement of refugees and support for the church in Tanzania and the Holy Land.

The wardens and several vestry members have participated in workshops and discussions to learn, explore, and network with other members of the Connecticut chapter of the Jesus Movement. In April, several attended the Seventh Annual In-Gathering and Training Session in Berlin and participated in a variety of workshops touching on finances, vestry-building, care of our buildings, the Church in the age of social media, and many others. In May, Alan attended a meeting of other wardens in the North Central region for the purpose of making connections and exploring resources. Central to both of these events is the reality that even in challenging times, we do not go it alone; our questions are other people's questions, and that we have much to give as well as to receive from our brothers and sisters in Christ.

Fr. Don Hamer, Trinity's rector for over fifteen years, was feted on the occasion of his retirement with an informal evening gathering and a "roast." He preached his last sermon here on March 3rd. His mark is so deeply etched on the communal life here that is has been hard to imagine the church without him. Fortunately, the vestry is well-positioned to handle the transition to a new permanent rector. First, it must be noted that due to our improved financial situation, it will be possible for us to call a full-time rector. This makes Trinity distinctive; many churches make do with half-time or even quarter-time clergy. Second, thanks to the generous service of our volunteer associate clergy, and the fortuitous presence of Fr. Ben Wyatt, we are better prepared than most to maintain continuity of both pastoral and liturgical services. The wardens have been in constant contact with the Rev. Lee Ann Tolzmann, Canon for Transitional Ministry, and with Bishop Laura Ahrens, who have given assurances of the importance of Trinity's role in the diocese and the community.

That said, there is a real dearth of available clergy—not at all the same situation as it was fifteen years ago. Although a parish as vibrant and energetic as Trinity will doubtless attract a number of qualified candidates, the process cannot be rushed. Our discernment must be undertaken with prayer and patience and, in particular, faith that God is indeed working in this place and will lead us as we move forward in this new phase of our life together. Amen.

DIRECTOR OF MUSIC MINISTRIES REPORT 2018-2019

The Choir School of Hartford and the Trinity Choir have had a busy and fulfilling musical year.

Highlights of the year include:

- A musical weekend in September with noted LEVAS composer Grayson Warren Brown.
 Our choirs combined with the choirs of Saint Monica's Church on Main Street for Evensong, a choral workshop, and Eucharist featuring Mr. Brown's repertoire.
- The inauguration of a monthly Evensong series on first Tuesdays with the choristers of The Choir School of Hartford, occasionally featuring guest conductors and organists.
- In October, a tour by the choristers to a choral festival at Saint Luke's Church in Darien.
- In November, a Festal Choral Evensong for the Feast of All Saints.
- A liturgical performance of Mozart's *Missa Brevis in F* for Christ the King Sunday with guest soloists and players.
- Monthly performances by the choristers at and with Emanuel Lutheran Church on Capitol Avenue.
- Weekly Sunday Night Compline during Advent and Lent.
- A Christmas Prelude featuring the carols of Alfred Burt.
- In January, a performance by the choristers for the residents of Middlewoods of Farmington.
- In February, a guest evensong at Saint John's Church in West Hartford (This appears to be developing into a tradition).
- On Palm Sunday, a performance of Allegri's *Miserere*, a monumental setting of Psalm 51.
- A profoundly beautiful Triduum and Easter Day featuring the music of Byrd, M. Haydn, Stainer, Tallis, Kuhnel, Palestrina, Howells, M. Bedford, Stanford, R. Thompson, Franck, Bach, Vivaldi, and Handel.
- In May, two weeks of collaboration with Emanuel Lutheran Church, combining the choirs.
- In May, a tour by the yellow-level choristers to a Choral Festival in Engelwood, New Jersey.

The Friends of the Choristers (our chorister parents) have been fundraising for The Choir School, including a butter braids fundraiser that raised a profit of \$579. I am immensely grateful to Ifeoma Mogor for her leadership with this group.

In April, the annual board fundraiser, *An Evening of Songs and Treasures* was held at the Pond House Cafe in Elizabeth Park. The event was coordinated by our wonderful board President, Ernestine Weaver and was the result of months of hard work by her and the members of the board. The total profit for The Choir School was \$7,916.

In October of last year, I attended the GIA (Gregorian Institute of America) Fall Institute in Chicago. GIA is the publisher for RSCM in this country, and the institute held many seminars on church music, choral music, choral conducting and organ playing. In addition, the Institute held instructional classes on elementary school choral music education and musical theatre. I utilized practices learned at the institute in my work as organist and choirmaster and in my work as choral director for Trinity Academy.

This July, I will attend the conference of the Association of Anglican Musicians (AAM) in Boston. The conference is a nationwide gathering of musicians and clergy of The Episcopal Church, and will include concerts, liturgies, lectures, seminars and masterclasses.

I am immensely grateful to Anne Green, Ernestine Weaver, and Enid Oberholtzer for their assistance and wisdom in their collaboration with the administration of this program. I am grateful for the support that Trinity Church has given to our music ministry. In particular, I am grateful for the Trinity's continued financial support of The Choir School of Hartford, which remains one of the finest and most comprehensive chorister programs in the region.

Acolyte Program

The Acolyte Ministry offers an active learning opportunity to younger members of the church to learn about and deepen their faith by serving as full participants in our worship; thereby serving God, the Trinity community, and their own faith development. Acolytes together learn and practice four principles in their ministry: Responsibility, Teamwork, Leadership, and Reverence.

Each acolyte participates in one or two worship services each month. Starting at 9 AM each Sunday the more-experienced acolytes guide the others in the preparation of the chancel, assigning the roles each will take during the service, and practicing any role or action as anyone might request. Then they light the candles, gather with the choirs and other ministers in the parish hall, and, at the right time, lead them all into the church. At the end of the service, they lead the choirs and other ministers back into the world, and they return to the church to extinguish the candles, move all the altarware to the sacristy, and reset the chancel. Mr. Roy McAlpine serves as their guide and resource person when questions arise, as does Mr. Ray Wilson.

Currently eight young people* participate in this ministry, down from 14 last year, and 21 just four years ago. (*We began this program year with 11 acolytes, but over the course of the year, three went out on leave.) The second column below shows who will remain for the next year. We have begun actively inviting more families to seriously consider guiding their children to, and supporting them in this ministry.

You are also welcome to support their ministry by chaperoning, and helping to plan and carry out their fellowship gatherings during the year. Special thanks to parents Jannel Thomas and Carla Griffith who have shared their time and talents so generously.

Christian Formation for Children and Youth/Church School

Nurserv

The nursery opens at 9:30 a.m. on Sunday mornings for the 10 a.m. service. For most special services the nursery opens 30 minutes prior to the service time. The nursery houses plenty of toys, stuffed animals, etc. to keep a little one busy. The current staff consists of Johanna Ramos. All church members and visitors are welcome to bring their child or children age 3 years and under to the nursery.

Godly Play

Godly play takes place during the 10:00 a.m. service in the Godly Play room located on the second floor of the education wing. Children are reunited with their families during the Peace. Godly play is a storytelling based curriculum for children age 2nd to 3rd grade. Each story is carefully crafted and includes hands-on material that helps the children learn about the mystery of God-With-Us. The stories themselves strongly engage the students and are based on the bible, sacraments, and liturgy of the Episcopal Church. Following the telling of the story there is a time for wondering out loud and "work". The group is staffed by two adults, a storyteller and a door person. The role of the door person is to greet each student and help the children with their materials. We are thankful for our storyteller Nancy Crandall. Clement Mogor and Kate Rousseau are Co-coordinators of Godly Play.

Grades 3-5

This group meets in Classroom 4 on the second floor of the education wing at 11:30am after the 10:00 am Sunday service. This group is also staffed by two adults, one adult leader to teach the lesson of the week and the door person to welcome each child. The curriculum used for grades 3 to 5 is "Feasting on the Word", a lectionary-based resource which has helped the children to focus on the scripture by using the Bible, resource sheets and activity books. The class is taught by Clement Mogor and Kate Rousseau, and our Door Persons Corlet Ude and Agatha Okeke.

Journey to Adulthood and Rite-13

The Journey to Adulthood Programs and youth programs (J2A and Rite-13) have created new ways to build relationships with the leaders, parents, and church community. The curriculum used is from Leader Resources, along with the lectionary-based "Feasting on the Word" curriculum. This curriculum has proved to be an essential tool for discussing difficult contemporary issues with today's youth. The youth leaders demonstrated exceptional preparedness in using scripture along with their creative ability in responding to challenging questions and provided answers that were thought provoking. Students are encouraged to be present each Sunday for the continuity of critical discussions which provide clarity to interpretations discussed the prior week. Marcus Clark is the dedicated leader carrying on the tradition of J2A. The Rite-13 program is led by Lana Saunders and Clement Mogor. Their continued commitment to leadership is greatly appreciated.

Church by the Pond – Bushnell Park Program

For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink. Matthew 25:34 Trinity Church participates six times a year in Church by the Pond at Bushnell Park, in support of the Ecclesia Ministry and Church Street Eats programs coordinated by Christ Church Cathedral.

We gather for public prayer at the pond by the carousel. Volunteers and anyone attending the Eucharistic service are spiritually fed. During the Prayers of the People prayers for intercession and thanksgiving are raised to God from those attending the service. Following the Eucharist, bagged lunches are provided to those in need.

A dedicated group of parishioners and friends, assemble, pack and distribute lunches which consist of sandwiches, fruit, a snack and bottled water. We make between 60 and 100 lunches each time, the largest number in the summer months. We also distribute additional items such as socks, toiletries or gloves. Volunteers from children to seniors participate with some students fulfilling community service credits through this ministry. Friends and families are always welcomed.

Our participation in Church by the Pond is currently self-supporting, thanks to the generous contributions of parishioners and community friends.

If you feel called to join this ministry, you are welcome to join at any time. On the third Saturday of the even months, volunteers gather at 12:30 p.m. in the Trinity kitchen to prepare lunches, and then travel to Bushnell Park for the 2:00 p.m. Eucharist. Covenant to Care

This ministry organizes giving opportunities for at-risk children in the foster care system and others through our adopted social worker Quiniesha Brown, who works with the Klingberg Family Centers. Trinity's coordinator is Don Cook.

Covenant to Care is all about children; encouraging them, fulfilling their dreams and helping them in times of trouble. Children are a gift and the Covenant is about caring for them. We have also started to include our students at Trinity Academy in our efforts. We now reach out to them through four major activities.

- In the fall, as school starts, angels purchase age appropriate supplies and backpacks to equip and inspire students at the start of their academic journey.
- At Christmas, Trinity's Giving Tree grants wishes through the distribution of gifts that may be the only present a child receives. This past Christmas the 2nd and 3rd grade Trinity Academy students' wishes were added to the tree, joined by parishioners of Asylum Hill Congregational Church, who contributed gifts for the Trinity Academy 4th graders. In addition a generous individual gave every student an additional gift along with what they had requested on the tree.
- In the spring, a collection of emergency care packs helps ensure the safe transition of young people abruptly removed from unsafe living conditions. Items are placed in reusable bags with Trinity's name and contact information. We are happy to report that the number of requested care packs has decreased which tells us life is getting better for our at risk kids.
- Again this year as part of our Lenten Season of Giving, new sneakers were collected for the Trinity Academy students. On Maundy Thursday, sneakers for the Academy children were blessed and distributed. The Academy students were this year's priority.

Over the past year, the number of children in these programs has increased greatly. The generosity of the congregation has matched the challenge.

Foodshare

Members of Trinity Church support the work of Foodshare in several important ways.

A number of parishioners regularly work together with other volunteers in the Bloomfield warehouse on Wednesdays, in both the 8:30 - 11:30 am and 12:30 to 3:30 pm shifts.

We work in the food salvage area sorting truckload donations from major grocery stores, wholesalers and club retailers, repacking what can be distributed to partner social service agencies, determining what can be given for feed to a pig farmer or sent for energy reclamation, and what must be discarded — often sorting 6000 to 8000 pounds of food on a day.

Two parishioners ride as volunteers on the mobile Foodshare trucks, each of which takes more than three tons of fresh produce, bread and other groceries daily to distribute to folks in more than sixty neighborhoods in Hartford and Tolland counties.

On Saturday, April 27, members of the parish again formed Team Trinity: Trinity Feeds His Flock, and with the help of financial sponsors walked together from Dunkin Donuts Park in the annual Walk Against Hunger.

Loaves and Fishes - Food Assistance

This program, formerly housed at Trinity and now based at Immanuel Congregational Church at the corner of Woodland Street and Farmington Avenue, serves lunch on weekdays and offers other support services to those in need in the Asylum Hill neighborhood. Trinity Church is committed to providing the meal on the third Wednesday of each month.

The meal is prepared each month in Trinity's kitchen the Tuesday before the meal is served. Meal ingredients are purchased by volunteers Kate Rousseau and family. A volunteer cooking crew, which has six members, prepares and packages the meal. Our volunteers are Louisa Cummings, Marion Pereira, Verona Cascio, Susan Post, Richard Syracuse, Maryjane Furrer, and Steve Zhitnik. The volunteer cooking crew provides two menus, one created for the warmer months after input from Loaves and Fishes patrons: Make -Your-Own Tuna Fish sandwiches is very well received. During this year, at the request of Loaves and Fishes staff, our Pasta with Meat Sauce was replaced by a chicken/sausage/vegetable and rice dish. Another group of volunteers, from Trinity and other Hartford area churches, headed by Karin Peterson, serves the monthly meal on Trinity's Wednesday at Loaves and Fishes. The Trinity serving team is supplemented by three other faithful volunteers from other churches. Between 75 and 100 individuals are served each month, with numbers averaging in the 80's.

This year, the Loaves and Fishes Team took a break from preparing the 2019 Maundy Thursday Agape meal, and turned this task over to the entire Parish. Watch for announcements next year for what has become a tradition thanks to the efforts of the Loaves and Fishes team.

Mbugani Parish/ Diocese of Tabora, Tanzania

Trinity has had a partner relationship with this diocese for over 15 years and has funded scholarships in most of these years for students to attend secondary school. As the result of additional outreach funds being available in January 2019, Father Hamer asked that Trinity fund 8 scholarships of \$2000 per student, with one for Emelda Janson who has one more year at St. Peter's secondary school, and 7 for new students to attend St. Peter's for the 2019 school year. Each additional year of school makes an important impact on the future of these students. The focus for the remainder of the year will be to explore possible fundraising events to help raise some of the funds needed to continue funding these student's education. It is hoped that there will be a fundraiser at 10,000 Villages in West Hartford, which has raised funds for this purpose in the past.

In late 2018, Debbie Hamer, who has guided this ministry for many years, passed the baton to Heather Kramer to coordinate this secondary school scholarship program. Heather will coordinate the scholarship fund including possible fund raising efforts as well as the interim contact with Bishop Elias Chakupewa of the Diocese of Tabor, Tanzania, until an interim rector is appointed. Bishop Chakupewa has requested that Trinity Hartford plan a mission trip to Mbugani Parish in the near future.

Outreach T-shirt

It was decided at the July 2018 Outreach team meeting that we would design and hand out a Trinity T shirt to the congregation. This was really a branding effort to advertise who and where we are. Kate Smith, with the assistance of the Custom Ink design team and the Outreach team's input, ordered the shirts in late September. 252 shirts were ordered in both children's and adult sizes. In November an additional 60 ordered as we ran out of medium and large. The total order was \$2,531.36. After the initial handouts were done, we received \$740 in donations. We had asked this to be put toward Outreach projects, rather than say each shirt cost \$10.00. We thought some people could pay this, but others could not. So this was an optional request. T shirts were again handed out in January and again in April before the Foodshare walk. Donations received in April went to the Foodshare walk as we were collecting the same day and this seemed a good use for the money. Shirts are still available and everyone should have one. See Kate Smith if you still need a shirt.

Refugee Resettlement

Over the past year, Trinity Church's Refugee Resettlement Committee, with our partners at Trinity College and St. Patrick St. Anthony Church in Hartford, resettled another refugee family in the Hartford area. This family, a couple and their four children, are from Afghanistan, where the father worked for many years for the United States military, translating, managing projects, and defusing bombs. The children are now, for the first time, in school and rapidly learning English. Members of the committee located and furnished an apartment for the family, have arranged for the mother to study English, for the father to find employment, for previously unmet medical needs to be addressed, and for generally acclimating to a new life in a new culture. The committee continues to support the Syrian refugee family which we settled in 2016. We welcome everyone who is interested to join the Committee in these life-saving, and extremely rewarding, efforts.

South Marshall Street Interfaith Coalition

If we just sing of doing good, and don't walk through our neighborhood; to learn its hope, to ease its pain; our talk of good is simply vain

South Marshall Street, long regarded as one of the most *challenged* streets on Asylum Hill, is home to 200 refugee families, as well as residents of Marshall House Family Shelter, several Section 8 apartments, and 24 Habitat homes housing over 250 children – **just 3 blocks from Trinity Church**. The **South Marshall Street Interfaith Coalition** was formed through a cooperative coming together of churches (Immanuel Congregational, **Trinity Episcopal**, Grace Lutheran, Asylum Hill Congregational), businesses (Aetna), and non-profit organizations (Asylum Hill Neighborhood Assn., Salvation Army, Habitat for Humanity), along with many other businesses and non-profit organizations on Asylum Hill to create positive change while instilling a cohesive sense of community into this once neglected neighborhood.

The Coalition holds meetings on the second Tuesday of each month at Immanuel Congregational Church for the purpose of working together to find solutions to enhance the lives of the residents in the neighborhood.

This is accomplished primarily through a series of seasonal Block Parties on the street, organized by the Coalition and held in June, October, and April, where food, fun-activities, and music blend with representatives from churches and community service organizations that provide information about free medical and social services available to the residents.

The June Block Party is the largest and most festive South Marshall Street Party of the year (next scheduled party: Tuesday, June 25, 2019 – 4:00-7:00 pm – Consider this your invitation!)

Last year, over 500 friends and neighbors enjoyed the chance to "meet and greet" new and old neighbors while enjoying an abundance of activities -- food, amusements (including Trinity's "Bouncy Castle" rental), street performers, music, opportunities for voter registration, wellness checks, Trinity Academy and Choir School information tables, and hundreds of free children's books and other goodies.

In October 2018, in addition to the usual activities, games and community organization information tables, Coalition members provided pumpkins and apples at the Autumn Block Party. Trinity donated socks, gloves, and a few pairs of shoes to the South Marshall Street residents to help fend off winter's chill.

The **April 2019 Block Party**, held just before Easter offered Easter egg coloring, more games, always an endless supply of free books, reusable bags from Wheeler Clinic, and pizza (**provided by Trinity**).

But, don't just take my word for it – seeing is believing -- All Trinity parishioners and friends are encouraged to participate in the seasonal Block Parties joining in to witness the miracle(s) happening on South Marshall Street (with a little help from the **South Marshall Street Interfaith Coalition**)

The property committee meets every month but August on the 2nd Wednesday of the month at 7 p.m. We welcome new attendees/members to attend the meetings.

The property committee is responsible for overseeing the campus of Trinity Church, to keep it working and providing the space we all know and expect. In order to accomplish this we create a budget, prepare a capital improvement plan and schedule any work.

It became apparent that, with the existing budget, we were falling behind. We are working with a parttime property manager and there were not enough hours in his schedule to complete the work necessary. We have had several parishioners volunteer to assist Vinnie. It is wonderful to have folks with knowledge of building systems and grounds to help us. I want to mention Peter Green, Neill Derrick and Paul Cooper and thank them for their gifts. Paul Cooper is the one responsible for the renewed labyrinth: his parting gift to a parish he loved and cherished!

The true means of assistance is now the Campaign for Trinity that will be helping to finance campus improvements. The Trinity campus is a gift not only to the parish but also to the neighborhood. It is our responsibility to ensure a safe and useful space for others. A good example of this is that the Memorial Garden area is open during the summer hours for quiet contemplation, a place to sit and have lunch as well as have our outdoor 8am service on Sunday mornings.

A few of the repairs done this past year are: front steps and entrance, water feature in the Memorial Garden, an energy audit and the switch to LED bulbs throughout the campus, not a repair but a replacement of the coffee maker, new A/C units in the parish house to replace window units, upgrading the assistive listening system, door locks and push bars replaced or reworked, fixing the handicap lift in Huntington Hall, new hand dryers in the restrooms and ongoing slate replacement on the roof.

This is only a representation of what has been accomplished.

At the end of 2018 we began working with the Campaign for Trinity to decide which items will be paid from the capital budget and which by the Campaign. That is an ongoing, fluid list.

We continue to offer work days, both inside and outside days, in which anyone can participate. We have also had assistance from outside groups, namely Trinity College that helps on their "Do It" day. This is usually prior to the fall picnic. Thanks!

Thank you for letting us assist the parish in establishing Trinity as a continuing place of Welcome Hope and Healing. And thank you to Vinnie, the staff of Trinity Church, the Choir School of Hartford and Trinity Academy for their faithful nurturing of our buildings and grounds. A special thanks to all the numerous invaluable volunteers who assist in that nurturing.

The Campaign for Trinity

We continue to be excited about The Campaign for Trinity: Celebrating A Place of Faithful Service to Hartford. This campaign is about building up. Our goal is to raise \$750,000 to renovate the buildings of our church campus – we have quite a list of projects to complete with the funds we receive — but building up means more than bricks and mortar. This campaign allows us to build up our church community within and our connections to the wider community beyond.

The Campaign for Trinity has made significant headway in 2018 and 2019.

- June 2018 The Steering Committee is formed.
- June 2018 Barbara Roos, was hired as the Campaign Administrator.
- July, August and September the campaign took on an official name
 - a Case Statement was finalized and produced with the creative assistance of Rhode VanGessel, a former parishioner.
 - A video was produced that spoke about the campaign.
- The Campaign for Trinity was officially launched within the parish on Sunday, October 28, at a gala luncheon following the single 9:30 service held that day.
- November, December, January found our solicitors visiting with members of the parish.
- February 2019 was planned to be our Public Launch. However, a large snowstorm that forced us to postpone the event.
- April 30, 2019 Public Launch. We welcomed Hartford's mayor and other members of the larger community. And we announced the good news that Trinity was at 53% of our goal.

Since October, solicitors have been visiting Parishioners. From those calls, as of early June, 45 pledges have been received and 14 pledges are yet to be made. There are 77 more households to be visited. At this point we are at 60% of our goal. In the coming year, the Campaign will expand to include previous members of Trinity Church, and applications to corporations and foundations for support.

So, The Campaign for Trinity has gotten off to a good start, and money pledged has already begun to come in. Dave Desmarais, our Clerk of the Works, has begun gathering more detail on exactly what the intended projects entail, including specifications and what each one will actually cost. These projects are specific Capital Campaign projects, and are separate from the ongoing maintenance and repairs overseen by Trinity's Property Team.

The Vestry has named a Capital Works Committee to oversee these Capital Campaign projects. The membership of the committee, drawn from the Property Team and the Vestry, includes Kevin Chick, Martha Freimuth, Boo Morton, Alan Rice, Steve Sirotko, and Kathie Wilson. The committee has begun meeting with Dave Desmarais to make decisions about the scope of the work and the sequence of addressing the various projects. Steve Sirotko has agreed to chair this committee. The First Visible Work is a new stove in the kitchen.

The Capital Campaign Steering Committee gives thanks to: Barbara Roos who provides invaluable support as Campaign Coordinator, even as she has taken on additional responsibilities as Assistant to the Rector. Parishioners serving on the Steering Committee include Martha Freimuth, Linda MacGougan, Cathy Rowe and Ernestine Weaver; other members are Ken Johnson of NINA and The Rev. Bill Eakins. Thanks also to all the other volunteers who make the visits and help with events and everything in between. And thanks to those who have made or will make generous donations to help us reach our goal. It takes a living and prayer-filled Church to mount a campaign like this, and we're grateful to God that so many talented and generous people are stepping forward to make it happen!
