


FIRST LESSON: ACTS 1:6-14




Your love is steadfast and your strength never fails.

Dear Everyone ~

With these days of physical separation, we at Trinity have been finding ways to come together: worship on Sunday, Noonday Prayer on Thursday, occasional Evening Prayer services (for instance, this Thursday for Ascension), and various meetings at other times.

We'd like to add another way to gather: a Trinity Bible study. Rev. Norman and I after some discussion decided we'd like to offer a Bible study through Zoom. We'd like to use a cool approach created by folks at Yale specifically for parishes, and requiring no previous academic study. You can check it out at www.yalebiblestudy.org. (Please do! It's pretty interesting.) Each meeting starts with a conversational introduction to the subject from two faculty members, then offers discussion questions, and options for further reading. I find the curriculum both accessible and flexible. We can do as much or as little as we like with each session. It's up to us to use it in a way that works for us.

Most of the Studies have eight sessions, each focusing on one book of the Bible. I propose that we start with two introductory courses in sequence, each lasting just two sessions.

- 1. The formation of the biblical canon Who decided which writings would be in the Bible? When and how were these decisions made?
- 2. Reading the Bible What are some of the issues that cause some of us to find the Bible intimidating and confusing? How can it enrich our own spirituality? How can we understand its challenging presentations of violence slavery, and sexual behavior?

After that we can decide if we want to proceed, and which book to explore first.

I invite you to gather together with friends to explore The Book is which is the anchor of our faith. If possible, let's start on Tuesday, June 2. To enroll please send me an email or call me with time-slots on Tuesdays that would work for you. (As you know, some of us are working at their jobs at home or their workplace, and some of us are home with other occupations. Let's see if we can find a time that works for the most people.) We would like to have 8 to 12 people for the study. And for this first session we should probably plan on an hour and 15 minutes, since it will include some logistics for how we would like to learn together.

The Warden's Corner

This week, the Recruitment Committee is arranging video interviews of candidates who have applied to become our next Rector. We expect those interviews to occur during the first weeks of June. Once the committee selects three or four candidates for further consideration, Bishop Ahrens will talk with the candidates' bishops before passing the names to the Vestry. If all goes well in the process of reopening Connecticut, the Vestry will interview the candidates during late June and early July. Please pray with us that we will hear God's voice as we consider who to call as our next Rector.

The Task Force on Reopening Trinity Church will be formed this week. The complexity of this work is sobering! Our first task will be to define both the detailed list of things we need to know and the best place to acquire the needed information. News reports emphasize how little is known about this virus, and guidelines for how to be safe seem to change with remarkable frequency.

In the meantime, and for the foreseeable future, we will continue to offer worship online. Some of our members will not feel ready to join services in person even after we start gathering at 120 Sigourney Street. In addition, we've been able to welcome some folks we haven't seen in a long time due to other health concerns, and we don't want to lose touch with them. Currently, our technical support comes from Casey Rousseau and Jacob Troiano, and we are grateful for their untiring efforts to make online worship possible. Casey and Jake are exploring how to continue offering online access to our services as we progress through reopening the campus.

The Bishops of the Episcopal Church in Connecticut give a simple admonition to parish leadership in a weekly Zoom call: Following COVID-19 safety precautions such as wearing a mask, practicing personal distancing, and staying home if you have even mild symptoms of illness is an act of Christian love. We are called to love our neighbors as ourselves, and in this challenging time, that can only be done by following the COVID-19 guidelines.

Episcopal Church Presiding Bishop Michael Curry to join other faith leaders in remembering those who have died in global pandemic

The Episcopal Church is honored to share the following invitation from the National Council of Churches (NCC):

The National Council of Churches USA (NCC) will hold a public online memorial service on Sunday, May 24, 2020 at 6:00 pm ET to mourn the more than 300,000 people worldwide who have lost their lives to the COVID-19 pandemic, more than 90,000 of whom were in the United States. The NCC is comprised of 38 member communions ranging from mainline Protestant to historic African American and Orthodox churches.

This service, A Time to Mourn: An Ecumenical Memorial Service for Lives Lost to COVID19, will be broadcast on YouTube and Facebook Live.

The plans grew out of a profound concern by faith leaders that, due to the lock-down and other restrictions surrounding the coronavirus, people have been unable to properly grieve the passing of loved ones. The nation has not had a public moment of collective grief to acknowledge and mourn the impact of losing so many lives in such a short period of time.

Virtual Cystic Fibrosis Walk and Challenge: May 16th -June 5th It's time again for our annual Cystic Fibrosis walk!

Kate and Drew Smith's granddaughter, Sarah, was born with Cystic Fibrosis; she is now 10 years old and doing well. She and her family are sheltering at home in Illinois, as Sarah is a high risk person.

Team Strolling for Sarah does an annual walk (about 3 miles or one hour) to support the Great Strides program which raises research dollars for this genetic lung disease. The exciting news is a new drug, Trikafta, which Sarah will be able to take when she is 12. It will treat some of the causes for her illness and not just the symptoms. Research is important!

This year, instead of our walk in Wickham Park, Team Strolling for Sarah will be doing a "virtual walk", each on our own, anytime between Saturday May 16th and June 5th. We thought it would be fun to see how far we could walk over a 3 week period, so we're going to walk or run more than once. Join in our efforts to see how many miles we all can cover. Send us your information and let us know how far you walked and maybe send us an electronic photo. Together can we reach 650 miles?

The great thing about a virtual walk, is that you can do it any time you like and your walk can also be as short or long as you want! We'll keep you posted on our website below. This is meant to be a fun, free event.

Why through June 5th (6/5)? Way back in 1965, a little girl overheard her parents talking about the disease. She thought they said "65 roses" instead of cystic fibrosis, which is a mouthful. "Chasing Labyrinths" Now Available

Bill Ludwig's book on the labyrinths of Connecticut and Rhode Island is now available from Hotchkiss Publishing. Trinity's labyrinth, in our Memorial Garden, is among those featured.

Ludwig writes:

You have probably driven by many labyrinths without noticing them. I once walked across one in a church courtyard to ask directions only to be told I had been on it already! Thus the need for a guidebook to help you in your search so you may do a bit less chasing that I did.

Labyrinths have been enjoying a renaissance which began just before the turn of this century with the Lauren Artress Founder of Veriditas leading the way. In 1998 there were only 100 labyrinths listed online, today there are over 4,440 in the US alone. The oldest permanent outdoor labyrinth in Connecticut will be found in Litchfield, at Wisdom House, built in 1996. The increased interest in spiritualty, mindfulness, seems to have inspired the growth. They can be viewed as a metaphor for life with twists and turns. They teach us to trust the path we are on is our life's path.
