From the Wardens, September 2020

The Sunday morning schedule will be as follows:

- Morning Prayer will be said at 8:00 am in the Memorial Garden.
- Morning Prayer will be broadcast at 10:00 am via Zoom.
- You may participate in either the 8:00 am in person worship or the 10:00 am Zoom, or both.

Here is a summary of the mechanics of Sunday morning gathering in the garden:

Gathering.

- **Masks are required to be worn by the congregation. A limited supply of masks will be available for those who do not have one.**
- Entrance and exit to the Memorial Garden will be through the Sigourney Street garden gate only.
- Upon entrance, an Usher will ask you if you have registered for the 8:00 am service.
- **IMPORTANT: Please sign-in using the book by the garden gate entrance.**
- Chairs are set up with 6 ft distance between. Please sit in one of the open spaces, keeping 6 feet between you and others not of your household.
- Restrooms in the Narthex are available if needed.

Worship.

- Single use Bulletins will be provided. Please take your bulletin home with you.
- **There will be no congregational singing.**
- An Offering plate will be provided on the steps going up to the church inside the Memorial Garden; plates will not be passed.
- There is no coffee hour.

PLEASE NOTE:

If you are not feeling well, running a fever, coughing, etc., you should not attend church until you are well and have completed a 14-day self- quarantine. The same is true for those who have come into contact with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19. If you have, you must complete a 14-day self- quarantine before attending church. Those in vulnerable populations should carefully consider whether or not to attend Sunday public worship.

For those who cannot come to church, webcasts and Zoom offerings will continue.

In this session, Julian will discuss why he believes church communities must find their roles in movements for social justice.

Julian Rose is a social justice community organizer, engineer, writer, and educator with years of experience in diversity, equity, and inclusion. As a former employee of Student Diversity Programs at Georgia Tech, where he is currently a Ph.D. candidate in Biomedical Engineering, Julian used storytelling and photojournalism to highlight the diverse identities and experiences on campus. Julian is trained as a Brave Space facilitator, and is also a founding organizer of The People’s Saturday School, and the Political Education Chair of BYP100’s Atlanta Chapter.

Update on the Director of Music Ministries search

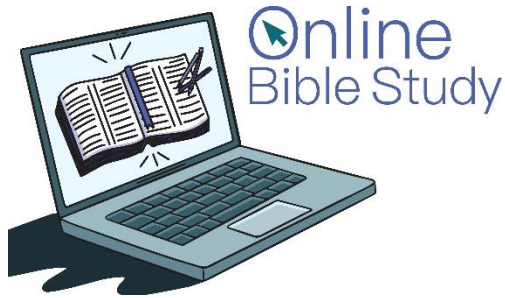

Assistance Available to Apply for Food Benefits and Husky Medical Benefits

As more Connecticut businesses close in Connecticut, and without renewed federal pandemic relief from Washington, more and more people are unable to fund their basic living expenses. If because of the pandemic you have lost your job or had your hours cut, or if you are self-employed and your income has significantly decreased, and you are worried about buying food or paying for medical care, please contact Anne Rapkin at a.rapkin@snet.net or 860-521-5992. Anne, or a member of Trinity's "public benefits team," will work with you to:

- (1) determine whether you may be eligible for SNAP (government financial assistance to purchase food) or HUSKY (government health insurance providing free medical coverage, including both prescription and over-the-counter drugs), and
- (2) complete an online application for SNAP and HUSKY benefits.

Trinity Academy's main mission is to reach children from the Greater Hartford's lowest income areas and help them achieve lifelong success through education, enrichment, and sense of community.

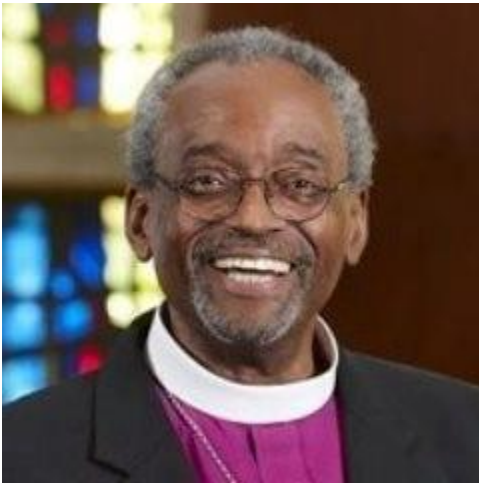

Presiding Bishop Michael Curry to Preach on 'Day 1' Presiding bishop and primate of The Episcopal Church

The Most Rev. Michael B. Curry, presiding bishop and primate of The Episcopal Church, is the featured preacher September 13 on "Day 1" with host Peter Wallace, the nationally broadcast ecumenical radio program also accessible online at Day1.org and by podcast. He has preached on the program numerous times since 1990.

Curry was installed in 2015 to a 9-year term. Previously he served as Bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina for 15 years and earlier served churches in North Carolina, Ohio, and Baltimore. A graduate of Hobart College in New York, he received an M.Div. from Yale Divinity School with additional studies at Princeton Theological Seminary, Wake Forest University, the Ecumenical Institute at St. Mary's Seminary, and other institutions.

His sermon "Not Just Me, But We" is based on John 13:12-15, 34-35, the story of Jesus' washing of the disciples' feet. He then gives them the commandment to love one another. "The command to love God, neighbor, and self is not new. It wasn't new then, or now. Jesus made it the centerpiece of his message but it wasn't new," Curry says. "So, what's new?"

Curry is the author of several books including "Crazy Christians: A Call to Follow Jesus," "Songs My Grandma Sang," and "Following the Way of Jesus: Church's Teachings in a Changing World." His latest book, "Love Is the Way: Holding on to Hope in Troubling Times," will be released in September.

The program includes interviews with Curry conducted by Wallace, who is also executive producer.

"Day 1" has been broadcast every week for 75 years, formerly as "The Protestant Hour." Featuring outstanding preachers from the mainline denominations, "Day 1" is currently distributed to more than 200 radio stations across America and overseas. The program is produced by the Alliance for Christian Media, based in Atlanta, Ga. For more information, check the program's website, <http://day1.org>.
