



THE FIRST LESSON

Genesis 3:8-15, 17-19 Read by Anne Rapkin

They heard the sound of the Lord God walking in the garden at the time of the evening breeze, and the man and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the Lord God among the trees of the garden. But the Lord God called to the man, and said to him, "Where are you?" He said, "I heard the sound of you in the garden, and I was afraid, because I was naked; and I hid myself."

He said, "Who told you that you were naked? Have you eaten from the tree of which I commanded you not to eat?" The man said, "The woman whom you gave to be with me, she gave me fruit from the tree, and I ate." Then the Lord God said to the woman, "What is this that you have done?" The woman said, "The serpent tricked me, and I ate."

The Lord God said to the serpent, "Because you have done this, cursed are you among all animals and among all wild creatures; upon your belly you shall go, and dust you shall eat all the days of your life. I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; he will strike your head, and you will strike his heel."

THE THIRD LESSON


Isaiah 9:2, 6-7 Read by Michael Okeke

His delight shall be in the fear of the Lord. Luke 1:26-38

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'" Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage."

When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

THE NINTH LESSON

John 1:1-14

Program Notes

Sally Beamish (b. 1956) was born in London and studied viola at the Royal Northern College of Music. She has held the position of Principal Viola for the London Mozart Players and Scottish Chamber Orchestra and currently is the composer-in-residence with the Academy of St. Martin-in-the-Fields.

Abbie Betinis (b. 1980) lives in Minnesota where she teaches composition at Concordia University- St. Paul and is the co-founding executive director of Justice Choir, an organization with a mission to encourage community singing to further social and environmental justice. Betinis is an award-winning composer and has received commissions from The American Choral Directors Association, Cantus, New England Philharmonic, and the St. Olaf Choir, among others.

Nathaniel Dett (1882-1943) has been lauded as one of the first American composers to fuse Negro folk music with European art music. He was the first African-American to graduate with a music degree from Oberlin College, one of the few unsegregated colleges at the time, and went on to be awarded additional degrees from Eastman School of Music and Howard University (honorary doctorate).

June Nixon (b. 1942) is one of Australia's best known organists, composers, and choral pedagogues. She received degrees from Melbourne University and is the Director of Music at St. Pau's Cathedral in Melbourne. She has been awarded an honorary title of Associate by The Royal School of Church Music and is an active member of The Association of Anglican Musicians.

Rosephanye Powell (b. 1962) hails from Lanett, Alabama, and currently serves as Professor of Voice at Auburn University. Her research focuses on vocal pedagogy and the art of the African-American spiritual. Powell is in great demand both nationally and internationally for master classes on spirituals and art songs by African American composers.

Nancy Telfer (b. 1950) is a Canadian choral conductor, educator, and composer and has written over 300 orchestral and choral works. She has dedicated much of her life to publishing books on choral technique and hosting workshops for conductors and singers.

André J. Thomas (b. 1952) recently retired after serving for many years as the Owen F. Sellers Professor of Music, Director of Choral Activities, and Professor of Choral Music Education at Florida State University. In addition to being an accomplished educator, conductor, and composer, Thomas is the author of Way Over Beulah Lan': Understanding and Performing the Negro Spiritual. Thomas is a recipient of the Robert Shaw Award and has been named a Living Legend by The African Diaspora Sacred Music.
