### **Summer 2021**

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted; a time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up; a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance; a time to throw away stones, and a time to gather stones together; a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing.

Ecclesiastes 3: 1-5

Kristen and I decided back in the winter that we did not want to have the worst yard on the block. So, as spring began to roll in we looked up information about the best time to plant grass and, once it seemed like we were past the last frost, prepped the ground and spread the seed. Now that things are growing out, I've noticed that there are some spots that either we missed or that just didn't grow in. I thought about doing another round of seeding but, according to

several websites that I consulted, it's much less likely that grass planted this time of year would actually grow well. This is not the ideal season for planting.

While it's relatively easy to figure out the ideal season for things based on the rhythms of the earth, there is no Farmer's Almanac or web search to help us effectively decipher the seasons of the spirit. To make things even more complicated, each of us may be in different seasons at the same time. As this summer unfolds I encourage you to spend some time noticing the seasonal markers of your spirit. Are you in a season of planting or harvesting? Are you in a season of weeping, dancing, laughing, mourning, or some mashup of many different things? What things are signs for you that you are not honoring the season which you are in?

What about our life together at Trinity? What does this summer season have for us? When I think about the coming months, it feels like a season of "re": re-gathering the community in person, reconnecting relationships, re-focusing on God's mission among us, and re-evaluating how we live into that mission. While each of those areas is broad and will be a part of our lives beyond this summer season, as we enter this season there are some specific starting points for us to engage. As we expand in-person worship, there is a need for people to support worship as Ushers, Altar Guild, Readers, and Intercessors. As we reconnect relationships, we can start with being intentional about ensuring that there is not a chasm between those who return to in-person worship and those who don't. As we

We want to make sure that folks who are not vet comfortable with in-person worship and those who can't come in person will still be able to be a part of our worshiping community.

For those attending the outdoor 8:00 a.m. Sunday services: With pandemic restrictions easing, those attending this service may remove their masks when seated.

## On the Horizon: Trinity Looks to Celebrate

The Capital Campaign has completed many projects that ensure the vitality of Trinity Church's campus, enhancing the quality of the lives of all who worship, learn, and use the buildings to serve our community.

The Campaign has reached 87% of its final goal of \$750,000.00. The Campaign was constructed to be a three-year venture to preserve the buildings of Trinity's campus for many future years of ministry and service. Based on its starting date, the time for the campaign to close will be this October, when we will be able to celebrate all the work that has been done to this historic church. While the end is in sight, securing the remaining funds will aid the parish in finalizing some important projects. # **Notes from the April and May Vestry Meetings**

The April meeting of the Vestry opened with a recording of the anthem "Christ Has No Body But Yours," which is often sung by the Trinity Choir and the Choir School of Hartford. Members of Vestry then reflected on the guilty verdict in the Derek Chauvin case, which had been rendered earlier that afternoon.

In her report, Rev. D. reviewed the Lenten, Holy Week, and Easter observances at Trinity Church. She thanked especially our Director of Music Ministries, Michelle Horsley, for her extraordinary efforts, and our "Virtual Vergers," Casey Rousseau and Jacob Troiano, for providing YouTube worship opportunities. She also expressed satisfaction with the Lenten study offerings on the topic of Personal Prayer and the Book of Common Prayer. She informed Vestry of upcoming musical events, including a chance for choir members and others to sing together in the Memorial Garden on May 1, a concert by the Choir School on May 30 in the parking lot of Emanuel Lutheran Church, and a performance of a Missa Brevis by Zoltán Kodály by musicians from Trinity Church, St. John's Church in West Hartford, and Emanuel Lutheran Church, which will be available on YouTube in May.

Rev. D. announced that Marsha McCurdy Adell has been chosen to serve on the ECCT Bishop Transition Committee.

Much of the meeting was devoted to a discussion of returning to inperson worship inside the church. Rev. D. has a target date of June 6 in mind. This is the Sunday after Trinity Sunday, and is the date of our Annual Meeting this year. All CDC recommendations will be followed, including maintaining social distance between families and wearing of masks at all times, including during singing. Communion will continue to be offered in one kind only.

Vestry agreed that 12-step groups may be invited to hold meetings in the Memorial Garden if they so choose. Huntington Hall is not available until a new Certificate of Occupancy is obtained from the City of Hartford, following the remedial work done after the February broken pipe damage.

The May Vestry meeting began with a recording of Shaun Davey and Rita Connely performing a hymn celebrating God's loving presence in all creation. The Vestry then ratified decisions previously made by the executive committee to use proceeds from the Doc Lane Fund to pay for two weeks of summer camp for four children in one of our refugee families, and to use Capital Campaign funds to begin work on a new fire alarm system.

In her Rector's report, Rev. D. thanked Michelle Horsley for her work on the small gathering of singers on May 1 in the Memorial Garden. We are still on target to hold our first indoor in-person service on June 6, which is also the date of our Annual Meeting. The service will also be streamed on YouTube for those who are not

yet ready to return in person, and the meeting will be available on Zoom as well as in-person.

Rev. D. reported that at the invitation of the Greater Hartford Interfaith Action Alliance (GHIAA), she and several members of Vestry attended a rally at the state capital in support of the "Clean Slate" bill. Trinity's involvement in GHIAA will continue to increase as more opportunities for education and training arise.

Bishop Laura Ahrens will be at Trinity on Saturday, October 2, to officiate at Rev. D.'s installation as Trinity's 13<sup>th</sup> Rector. Final plans for the service and celebration will be made over the summer.

Patrick Reid, who has served as administrator for The Campaign for Trinity for the past year and a half, has accepted a full-time position with another faith-based effort and will be tapering his involvement at Trinity over the next few months. We are grateful for all that he has brought to the campaign, and especially for his faithfulness during the pandemic.

Vestry discussed the position of Facilities Manager (Vinnie Pacileo's position), which has been a ¾ time job for the past two years. It is clear, however, that there is no way for one person working 30 hours per week to take care of our large campus and old buildings adequately. The Vestry therefore approved increasing the position to a

# Spring News from Trinity Academy

We were so happy to welcome our students back to our school's campus on March 1! Our students were so happy to be back together. They went right back to interacting and playing together... They also came back a lot taller!

April 28 was Nurse Carole's birthday. She was showered with

hand-made cards from all our students. Our third and fourth grade students even showed up to sing "Happy Birthday" to her!

Things around Trinity appear to be back to "normal" except for our necessary COVID-19 accommodations... Our students are eating a lot of healthy food at school – we place at least two grocery orders a week!

Our classrooms are filled with happy, smiling faces, and our students are enjoying some new and colorful rugs and bean bag chairs.

Your support and our talented teachers and staff equal amazing results for Trinity Academy's students! Despite the challenges of virtual learning, our students have grown academically this school year. Your generosity has made these results possible. Here are Trinity Academy's standardized NWEA MAP testing results as of early March 2021. Remember, at that point there were still four more months to go until the end of the school year. We could not be happier with these results:

- All our fourth grade students are at fourth grade level or above in each subject tested (reading, math, language) as of March 2021. Our school's goal is to have all of our students at least at grade level by mid-fourth grade.
- Three of our fourth graders are reading beyond 8<sup>th</sup> grade level, and two are at the 8<sup>th</sup> grade level in math. We cannot imagine what they will be able to do in the future!
- at grade level or higher in each subject as of March 2021. This was achieved despite virtual learning in the first half of the school year. Our third grade has 11 students; one student is new to the United States and cannot be tested in English at this time in order to be given a fair assessment.

# Ahli Hospital in Urgent Need of Our Help

I've lived through three wars in Gaza and I've seen nothing like this. The destruction is everywhere. I can't describe the horror and fear we feel. For the first time I am depressed and terrified. The innocent in Gaza and Israel are dying. Men, women and children who have done nothing wrong.

The current hostilities between
Jews and Arabs in Palestine and
Israel have stretched the
healthcare system in Gaza, which
was already overwhelmed by the
COVID-19 pandemic, to the
breaking point. The situation at
Ahli Arab Hospital, the
beneficiary of several fundraising
efforts at Trinity Church in recent
years, has become desperately
critical as the conflict has
escalated.

The hospital has been able to remain open, and, as of mid-May, had not yet sustained serious damage. There is no electricity in Gaza, forcing the hospital to run its generators full-time, and a new surgery ward has had to be opened to treat those wounded in the bombings, which have taken place in civilian areas, wounding and killing adults and children.

Medical supplies, medicines, and fuel for the generators at Ahli are all in very short supply. Hospital staff are working around the clock to cope with caring for the injured along with the many people seriously ill with COVID-19 whom they are also treating. They need our support to help provide the funds needed to purchase the supplies they must have to keep treating the sick and injured. Despite the current cease-fire, the situation at the hospital is, and will remain, dire.

You can help our friends at Ahli Hospital by making a donation to the hospital through the American Friends of the Diocese of Jerusalem. Every dollar you give goes directly and immediately to the hospital. AFEDJ is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization; your gift is secure, and tax deductible to the extent allowed by law.

# Reconnecting with Covenant to Care

In 2006 Trinity became part of the Adopt A Social Worker program of Covenant to Care for Children in Hartford, joining other community and faith-based organizations to partner with social workers in providing special items for children in need. Many of you will remember contributing back-to-school backpacks filled with school supplies in August, our annual Giving Tree to provide Christmas gifts in December, emergency foster placement packs in May, and most recently our collections of children's sneakers during Lent.

Unfortunately, over the years,
Trinity's relationship with
Covenant to Care broke down.
But the good news is that we are
reconnecting with this program
and are looking to once again
partner with a local social worker
to help meet needs of children in
this social worker's
caseload. Rev. D. has reached out
to learn more about how Trinity
can help in this important role.

### Asylum Hill Neighborhood Association - Spring 2021

The new Mission Statement for AHNA includes references to the native tribes associated with the area now known as Asylum Hill. The new mission statement is as follows:

AHNA Mission: The Asylum Neighborhood Association (AHNA) empowers and connects residents and stakeholders to improve the quality of life in Asylum Hill. AHNA acknowledges that Asylum Hill is on the traditional lands of the Poqonook, Sicoag, Tunxis and Wangunk tribes.

**David MacDonald**, executive Director of AHNA, has returned to full-time work following his stroke and subsequent rehabilitation, allowing him to focus on the fund drive, development of the Board, and possibly getting back to in-person meetings and getting the task forces up and running.

**Police** – There is an increase in drivers running both stop signs and red lights. Special attention is being paid to the intersection of Niles and Woodland Streets. Panhandling is also an area of concern. There is an effort to discourage panhandling at the entrances and exits of the highway.

**Fire Department** – Lt. Lopez asked that both homeowners and renters check their smoke detectors. The detectors are an easy way to discover smoke, or fire, before it gets out of control.

**Vaccine distribution** remains a main concern of the city. Appointments are still being made. Call 211 for more information. Transportation can also be provided.

A new Scooters for Rent program has started. It currently is available in the downtown area but it will expand this month. Speed bumps are going to be installed on three Asylum Hill streets this summer.

**Hartford Planning Development** – Approval of plans for the work being done at St. Joseph's Cathedral has been obtained. A parking survey is being conducted for the entire city; this will help with the development of future plans for parking in Hartford.

Community Court Update – Court is not fully re-opened yet. When it does re-open, the emphasis will be on backlogged cases from 2020. Research is being done nationwide into how to deal with low level offenders (panhandlers, quality of life issues like noise abatement).

**Hartford Decides** – \$40,000 is available this year for projects to be developed by residents and then presented for a vote by all residents 13 and older. Projects already submitted for Asylum Hill are: Sigourney Park monument, mini farm, Turning Point Park, community kitchen, dog waste and bike composting (collecting compost and food waste by bike to bring to a central location).

**Hartford Coalition for Safe Technology** v There is a plan to install 314 cell towers in the Hartford area to accommodate 5G technology, but there are concerns over how these installations might affect the health of the residents. The coalition is hoping to work with AHNA's Green Committee to speak to these concerns. The Green Committee meets the 2<sup>nd</sup> Monday of the month at 7 p.m. via Zoom.

**Stowe Center** – A \$2 million plan to increase ADA accessibility, make repairs and create an outdoor classroom at the Center has received \$385,000 from the National Endowment for the Humanities. A letter of support from AHNA for the Center's application for additional funding from the state was approved.

**Neighborhood news** – The Comet building (old Aetna Diner) has been approved as an historic property and plans for restoration have been approved.

**Garbage to Gold** – This is an event planned for 6:00 p.m. on Saturday, June 5, at the Niles Street Garden. There will be food and drink and information available on composting.


