All of us have broken relationships or unrealized possibilities. All of us have bodies that just don't do what they used to do. Though grief is personal, every person grieves."

~The Rev. Jacqui Lewis, "Good Grief" sermon at Middle Church July 9, 2017

In one of his recent email meditations, Fr. Richard Rohr, OFM, shared the above quote. I often find that grief is one of those things that I'm comfortable with when it stays in its "proper" place, like at a funeral or a significant milestone of a loss. But, when grief shows up at inconvenient times or places, I often try to ignore it, push it to the side, or try to find

other ways to put it back into a neat little box on the shelf. Of course, grief never stays in the neat little boxes that we may try to put it in.

As I keep rereading the excerpt from Rev. Lewis' sermon, I keep thinking more and more of the grief that we often don't name as grief, the grief that arises from losses that we try to brush off as just a part of life. I wonder if we shy away from naming the grief that we carry out of fear of being overwhelmed by it, or perhaps worse, fear that others will think that we are making a big deal out of a small thing. But, naming the grief allows us to connect with others in a more real way than a superficial smile and "I'm fine." Naming the grief helps us to open ourselves more fully to God's transforming love and the assurance of God's presence in the midst of our sorrows. As we excitedly kick off another church program year, it's important for us to remember that grief does not negate joy. It's okay to name as grief the disappointment that our Homecoming celebration won't feature the bounty of delicious food that usually accompanies Trinity celebrations. It's okay to name as grief the agitation of once again having to wear masks indoors because the COVID-19 pandemic is not over yet. It's okay to name as grief the frustration that seemingly simple things around the parish aren't happening in the way that they used to. It's okay to name the grief, even as we seek to keep the spark of joy burning bright in our hearts.

Because we're human, we hurt. Because we're human, we have tears to cry. Yet even in the midst of the tears that flow and the tears that slowly trickle; even in the midst of days when a sense of loss weighs down every step and days when a sense of loss unexpectedly settles in like a fog; even in the midst of personal and collective grief that we don't have words for, we make our song: Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia.

Adult Christian Formation – Plans for 2020-2021 (You Can Help!)

Over the summer, the task force for Adult Christian Formation (ACF) became keenly aware of another effect of our COVID-19 isolation: since all our Sunday forums and other educational events in the past year took place on Zoom, we have not had much feedback on our offerings. As we begin planning Sunday forums and special events for the coming program year, we are asking for your opinions and ideas. A questionnaire is available now online at Trinity ACF Survey (google.com); paper copies are also available at the church. We hope that you will take a few minutes to let us know what topics and presentation formats interest you.

While we eagerly await your input, the ACF team has put together a tentative outline of programs for the fall. The first ACF Sunday forum will take place on September 26. This will be an open forum with Rev. D., which we're calling "Ask the Rector." There is no particular theme for this forum; whether your questions are about liturgical practices, parish administration, living a faith-filled life, re-opening after COVID-19, or anything else you've been wondering about, join us on Sunday, September 26, after the 10 a.m. service. We will be meeting in the Library (in masks) and we will also be logged in to Zoom, so if you are not comfortable with in-person gatherings yet, you can still be with us. We expect to continue this hybrid format for the foreseeable future.

The Trinity Community for Racial Justice (TCRJ) has designed a tour of Hartford murals. The tour can be completed by automobile in a little more than an hour, and will take place on Sunday, October 10. Look for more detailed information in the next issue of *The Voice*. On October 24, our delegates will report on the annual convention of the Episcopal Church in Connecticut.

As you can see, the ACF team (Suzanne Blancaflor, Pat Bunker, Frank Kirkpatrick, Mark MacGougan, Roy McAlpine and Everett Post) has been busy planning and scheduling educational events and forums. We really need your input, though, so that our events meet your needs. Please complete our brief questionnaire! As you do so, please also consider whether you might be called to join our team.

Oh, how good and pleasant it is, when kindred live together in unity!



Course Week, led by Michelle Horsley, our Director of Music



Ministries. The program meets from 9--5 each day, August 23-27, and the schedule is a busy one! This year's course offers a very full calendar of music projects, sessions with guest clinicians, workshops, games, rehearsals and community building activities. Guests this year are Benjamin Rauch (lecturer and conductor at Hartt / private vocal coach / former member of GRAMMYwinning ensemble Chanticleer), Anna Zayaruznaya (professor of musicology at Yale / scholar in 14th-century motets and the history of music notation), Debbie Stowell (violinist and violist, studying Suzuki method and pursuing a degree in music education at Hartt), and Jonathan Reuning-Scherer (Director of Music at Emanuel Lutheran). Sessions will include music in liturgy, harmonization projects, sightreading circles, conducting practice, composition, assembly of a kit pipe organ, world rhythms, and handbell workshops. A field trip to the Wadsworth Atheneum will cap off the week.

The Choir School and the Adult Choir will be back in the choir loft to begin the new program year Sunday, September 12.

News from the Trinity Community for Racial Justice

"Resolved, that this Convention direct each Parish, Worshipping Community, and Intentional Episcopal Community to take steps to discover and document historic complicity in racism in their parish and communities." (From Resolution 7 of the 2020 ECCT convention)

• This summer the Trinity Community for Racial Justice has been working on several projects. The first project is in response to the requirement in Resolution 7, quoted above, that asks us to take steps to discover and document historic complicity in racism in our parish. Under the guidance of Liz Kirkpatrick, our parish archivist, and with the help of many resources from the ECCT, we have begun to review our records and other sources to put together the story of Trinity in the context of the question. We are focusing on three eras in our country's and Trinity's history, using our archives and the resources available for this type of research in Hartford and beyond.

We are seeking members of our parish who love history, love Trinity and its mission, and can do some targeted research on important people, related institutions and other questions, including interviewing members of the parish and others who were witnesses to important milestones in our history in the late 20th century. We are already well under way with our project plan and research work, but we need more help to be successful. The project will run until June 2022. We will be using Realm as a project management tool.

Notes from the June Meeting (and Summer Activities) of the Vestry

The June 15 Vestry meeting opened with a video of the Cambridge King's College Choir performing "And I Saw a New Heaven" by Edgar Bainton, which had been selected by Casey Rousseau.

The Vestry then passed the consent agenda, which included approval of Vestry minutes from the May meeting as well as confirmation of Jennifer Reilly to be a board member for The Choir School of Hartford. Jennifer has been an active supporter of the Choir School. She is the wife of Jim, who is in the adult choir, and the mother of Sophie (a chorister), PJ and Carolyn.

New Vestry members were welcomed and those present introduced themselves.

The Vestry members then split into groups of two for one-on-one community-building conversations, following Relational Meetings guidelines provided by Rev. D.

Visitors included Martha Freimuth and Drew Smith, who together with Mark MacGougan provided an update report regarding the Capital Campaign (The Campaign for Trinity). In round numbers, the campaign has so far raised \$650,000 - with \$550,000 collected and \$100,000 in outstanding pledges. This is short of the goal of \$750,000, but the campaign is not yet over and the amount raised to date represents very generous giving from parishioners and others that is much appreciated.

Money raised by the campaign has been spent on a variety of projects that have made the Trinity buildings more sound, secure, and attractive. One concern is that the most current project – a complete upgrade of the fire safety systems – cannot be funded from the money raised to date by the campaign. The remaining cost of the project is about \$110,000. This is more than the outstanding campaign pledges and will be due over the next few months, which is sooner than most of the outstanding campaign pledges will be paid. The project was necessary for building safety, and so had already been started.

The Vestry discussed whether money should be taken from the "old" endowment to cover the remaining cost of the fire safety systems. This would be permissible, as fire safety systems are a necessary capital expense. It was not clear, however, how much money would be needed, and members of the Vestry expressed reluctance to use any more endowment money than necessary. The final resolution approved by the Vestry was to authorize the Treasurer to draw on endowment funds for this purpose, if needed, up to a maximum amount of \$100,000. As additional funds are received by the Capital Campaign, they would be used to repay funds withdrawn from the endowment.

The Capital Campaign report also noted that two projects that had

been planned to be included – painting the interior of Goodwin Hall and repaving the parking lot – are currently on hold pending the raising of additional funds. There was some discussion within the Vestry whether some portions of these projects might be accomplished by parish volunteer labor.

The Vestry also agreed to have a special joint meeting with representatives of the Capital Campaign to discuss how best to coordinate between the Capital Campaign and the Annual Appeal. This meeting will be on Wednesday, September 29.

Rev. D led a discussion on whether Vestry meetings should be in-person or by Zoom. The consensus was to alternate between in-person and Zoom meetings, but to have a Zoom link available when the meetings are in-person. The next regularly-scheduled Vestry meeting, which will be on Tuesday, September 21, at 7 p.m., will be in-person.

On a separate matter, Mark reported that the church has been in discussions with IRIS (Integrated Refugee & Immigration Services) regarding the possibility of having them lease the former SIM offices on the second floor of the Parish House, to be used as a satellite office, supplementing their New Haven office. This was not yet ready for Vestry action.

There was also a brief discussion of the desire to have a special

"Welcoming Refugees" Program To Address Cultural Differences

IRIS (Integrated Refugee & Immigration Services) invites you to attend a Zoom program on "Welcoming Refugees: Deepening our Understanding of Culture – Their and Ours" from 6-7:30 p.m. on Wednesday, September 22. We all know we have cultural beliefs and values, but often give little thought to them when we are working with immigrants and refugees in their struggles to acculturate into the US. We arm ourselves with general knowledge about their culture, while ignoring our own, yet often we automatically see things through our own cultural lenses, hindering our ability to help refugees adapt to this new land. Through the use of numerous examples of cultural disconnects, this session will explore the broad categories of culture and their own cultural lenses, and offer suggestions for more in-depth exploration in times of cultural disconnect or discordance to enhance our ability to assist refugees.

This session will be moderated by psychotherapist Dr. Judi Durham, whose focus is on trauma, and who is a Professor Emerita at the University of Saint Joseph. She will be joined by Naji Aldabaan, whose family was co-sponsored under Judi's leadership and whose story was featured in the book *Welcome to the New World*.

event to help launch the new program year in the fall. This was subsequently organized into plans for Homecoming Sunday on September 12.

Over the summer, the Vestry has conducted some additional business:

- In late July, the Vestry approved by email a resolution to confirm Kitty Peterson for a one-year term as Warden and to confirm Alan Rice for a one-year term as Clerk. This represents a new role for Kitty, who had been serving as Clerk, and a return engagement for Alan, who served as Clerk for several years before he became a Warden. Kitty and Alan will be commissioned for these roles in church on September 12.
- A supplemental Vestry meeting has been called for August 24 to review plans to lease second floor Parish House space to IRIS.
