I just want to thank you, Lord.*

I have recently started to use the above song for the prayer after Communion during Thursday Noon Eucharists. The song is short and simple, but it captures so much of the orientation of life that we are invited into as we move from the Eucharistic Table into the varied textures of our lives. An orientation of gratitude is an invitation to look at all of life through the frame of God's gracious goodness to us. I don't mean that the difficulties of life should be dismissed. What I do mean is that even in the midst of the difficulties of life, we find strength to continue moving forward supported by the foundation that God's lovingkindness flows abundantly. As the writer of Lamentation writes, even in the midst of feeling burdened by the continual reminders of the difficulty of life, there is the abiding presence of God's faithfulness – "But this I call to mind, and therefore I have hope: The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness." (Lamentations 3:21-23) This hope born of the steadfast love of God is what enables us to live with an orientation of gratitude.

As we enter a more focused season of stewardship (it's always stewardship season!), I am inviting all of us into an orientation of gratitude. Yes, the pledge campaign is an invitation to intentional giving to financially support the ministry that God is doing among us at Trinity. But, before the pledge cards go out and the stewardship testimonials begin, I want to stop and ground us in an orientation of gratitude. It's easy to focus on things like how many people we no longer see on Sunday morning, how many projects around the building still need to be completed, how few people seem to be in a place to actively engage the ministries at Trinity, and all of the other ways that you may identify that things are not quite where we ideally would like for them to be. An orientation of gratitude does not invite us to ignore those important realities. Instead, it invites us to celebrate the vibrant worship that we have with those who are still showing up in person and online on Sundays; it invites us to recognize what a gift it is to have a building in this area that can be used for the good of others; it invites us to give thanks for the ways that each person who is a part of this Trinity Community enriches the lives of us all; it invites us to bask in the ways that the steadfast love of God has sustained us. We enter this intentional season of stewardship celebrating that because of God's goodness manifested in each one of us, together we are more than enough and we have more than enough to respond faithfully to the ministry that God has for us in this place.

Registration and Sign-in:

Sign up through the ECCT website, www.episcopalct.org; click on the “Bishop Consecration Updates” tab, then the “Consecration & Ordination” button, then “Register.” Attendees must sign in and receive a wristband prior to entering the ballrooms.

COVID Protocols:

Face masks and full vaccination will be required for attendance at the consecration.

Livestreaming:

The consecration will be livestreamed on ECCT’s YouTube channel. The link will be publicized prior to the service.

CONCORA To Perform Bach Motets at Trinity

CONCORA (Connecticut Choral Artists) will present a concert of all six of J. S. Bach's motets at Trinity Church on Saturday, October 29, beginning at 3:00 p.m. Although Bach wrote nearly 300 cantatas and several concert-length choral works, he composed only these six motets. Major

pieces in the choral repertoire, the motets are highly complex, demanding for the singer but a joy for the listener.

Tickets for the concert at Trinity can now be purchased through the CONCORA website (www.concora.org); click on the box for the October 29 concert date on the home page. Ticket prices range from \$25 to \$59 (\$15 for students). Trinity's members, staff, newsletter recipients and visitors are eligible for a 25% discount on tickets purchased in advance; this discount can be claimed by using the promo code TEC4MO22. (Be sure to purchase your tickets for the correct date; CONCORA is presenting this same program at two other venues around the state on other dates in October.)

A preview of the music for this concert is available on the CONCORA website. The web site also features recorded talks from CONCORA's artistic director, Chris Shepard, about each of the motets.

From Our Director of Music Ministries

The messages we send without speaking

As a music director, I'm constantly thinking about how to communicate a piece of music. Yes, notes and rhythms will be learned. We'll familiarize ourselves with the lyrics and the key, which staff to follow and what the general road map is (repeats, *da capos*, etc.). But music is not made by remembering a repeat sign or even singing the text accurately. Music is made by communicating *expression*. What are we expressing? What is the humanity in it?

Years ago, I'd find myself feeling self-conscious of the weird faces I'd inevitably make while conducting. I don't anymore. I'll often unknowingly raise my eyebrows for a particularly sensitive phrase and furrow them for a *fortissimo*. I'll feel my chest inflate comically for a particularly dramatic *rallentando* and I'll feel my arms get heavier before a final cadence. We hold these musical expressions in our bodies because that's where we hold our feelings. I've become more and more aware of the importance of stretching at the beginning of rehearsal so we can get more in tune with our bodies and, perhaps in a peculiar way, create space in ourselves to anticipate these musical expressions.

Naturally, I have become more aware of body language as a result. Perhaps some of you have heard of Dr. Albert Mehrabian's famous study which concluded that a staggering 93% of our

communication is non-verbal. When I am in a conversation with someone, I find myself tuning into how my body is responding to their energy. When I am in line at the grocery store, I find myself aware of which people are physically expressing impatience and which people are visibly at peace.

So as musicians – but perhaps just as humans – we ask ourselves: what are we intending to communicate? Is our communication consistent between our words and our gestures? During one of our sessions in Choir Course Week, our choristers discussed open body language and closed body language. How would we like to show up? What are we intending to express and how, exactly, are we doing that? In our rehearsal of the notes, are we also rehearsing our expressions? Are we also aware of how we are communicating this music with our bodies?

Truly, this applies to us all. As we sing hymns to the glory of God each week, are we also expressing that glory in our faces? Are we also expressing that gratitude for God and neighbor in the way we carry ourselves? Are we caring for our bodies so they can be used for holy expression? When the psalmist has written in Psalm 66, "Praise our God, all peoples, let the sound of his praise be heard!" I internally add to this, "let the sound of his praise be seen!"

May you feel this music in your bones, people of Trinity! May you express it in your hearts and share those expressions with your whole selves! God asks of us nothing less.

The Dadwall Kids Start School! - Refugee Family Update

On August 31, the four oldest Dadwall kids – Abna, 8; Abdul, 6; Mohammad, 4, and Amjad, 3 – started school. Abna is now in 2nd grade and Abdul in 1st, and they both “love” (I’m quoting) their new teachers and classmates. Both are excellent students, work hard, and get excellent grades, despite their still somewhat wobbly English skills. The littler boys are in preschool full-time, so they leave for school and return home with their older siblings. All four kids board the bus each morning together; Mom boards to belt Mohammad and A.J. into their seats, and then she and baby Zoya go home to a dramatically quieter household than during the summer. Zoya is 11 months old, having been born shortly after the family entered the United States last year and arriving in Hartford at three weeks, a little button of a thing. She’s now quite big for her age and thriving; she stands up and can take a few steps before plopping onto the floor and grinning up at everyone, and she’s beginning to form word-like sounds.

Saheba and Ferooz continue to study English, and Ferooz has fully prepared to take the learner's permit exam, if only we can convince the DMV to give the exam in Pasto or allow a translator on the day of the test. Since

Ferooz travels to work every day by bus, 1½ hours each way, it is essential that he be able to drive. Saheba is hoping to open a dress-making business in her home; more about that to come.
