"In those days Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth." Luke 1:39-40



The story of Mary's visit with Elizabeth is one we often engage toward the end of Advent when we're just about to cross over into the celebration of Jesus' birth. This visit begins just after Gabriel announced to Mary that, through the power of the Holy Spirit, she would give birth to the Son of God. Gabriel ends his visit by telling Mary that nothing is impossible with God, and telling her about the pregnancy of Elizabeth, her previously barren relative. Our focus is often drawn to the Song of Mary where she proclaims: "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior..." This Advent, though, I invite us to focus on the circumstances that allowed for the marvelous exchange between the two women – Mary set out and went.

In response to incredible and likely terrifying news, Mary set out and went. When she was in need of support and community, Mary set out and went. In the height of the COVID-19 pandemic when there was incredible life even in the midst of daily terrifying news, we restrained ourselves from going pretty much anywhere. As we enter this Advent season, where are you turning for support and community connection in a world still filled with incredible as well as terrifying circumstances and events?

Since Spring of 2020 we have been forced to re-imagine ways of being church, connecting with each other, being supportive community for each other, and empowering each other to proclaim the greatness of the Lord. Technology has allowed folks far and near to be a part of our community and has allowed those who previously had challenges getting to the building to have an avenue to stay connected. While we will continue to engage, explore, and develop ways that technology can support our ministry together, we are now very grateful to be able to re-engage with each other in person. Things are not the same as pre-COVID, and will probably never be exactly the same. What hasn't changed is that there is the opportunity for connection and community by gathering in person for worship and fellowship. Modified Community Fellowship Time (Coffee Hour) will resume during Advent after the 10 a.m. service. With vaccines now available for those ages 6+, plans are being made to resume Church School and other in-person formation for children and youth. We are remaining careful while seeking to live fully into our new normal. While there are many understandable reasons for folks to continue to worship primarily online, I wonder if for some of us it's simply become the default new normal. As we enter the season of Advent, I encourage you, when it is possible for you, to set out with due haste back into the physical presence of the community gathering at Trinity Church. Who knows what miraculous exchanges wait each of us?

Compline Series Continues Through March

Our current five-month Sunday evening Compline series, taking place at 9:00 p.m. on the first Sunday of the month, launched on November 7. The series will continue through March 6, with Compline for Advent on December 5 and a Christmastide Compline service on January 2.

"Compline" originates from the Latin word *completorium*, meaning "completion." Traditionally, it is the last service in a series of "canonical hours" prayer services held at fixed times throughout the day/night. This daily round of services has been observed in many monastic traditions for well over a thousand years, with the first known mention of Compline in the West dating back to the writings of St. Benedict in the 6th century. This final liturgical hour of the day is a short service of late-night music and prayers, and serves as a spiritual reflection before bedtime.

Compline services at Trinity comprise 30 minutes of prayer and mystical choral music, sung by a professional ensemble, and lit by candlelight. We invite you into this sacred, darkened space of meditation and music.

Thursday Service Change

The 12 noon service on the first Thursday of each month is now an in-person service of Holy Eucharist. The service on each of the other Thursdays of the month will remain a Zoom service of noonday prayer.

Lessons & Carols Service To Feature Music of Under-represented Composers

On Saturday, December 18, the Trinity Church choristers and adult choir will present a 7:00 p.m. service of Lessons & Carols. This service, a beloved tradition in

the Anglican Church, is comprised of nine scripture readings, each telling a part of the Christmas



story, and each followed by a musical selection. Candles are lit as the service progresses until we arrive at Jesus' birth.

The first formal service of "Nine Lessons and Carols" by that name took place on Christmas Eve of 1880 at Truro Cathedral in England. The best-known service of Lessons and Carols is performed annually at King's College, Cambridge, where the first such service was held in 1918; this extremely popular version of the service has been broadcast by the BBC annually since 1928, with the exception of only one year.

Our 2021 service of Lessons & Carols at Trinity will exclusively feature works by under-represented composers. For most of western music history, white

men have dominated the field. For hundreds and hundreds of years, women and people of

color had little chance to make careers as composers.
Subsequently, most choral libraries to this day have great disparities in terms of representation. For example, at Trinity Episcopal Church, our library includes approximately 2000 titles, only 17 of which were composed by women. (That's less than 1%.) The aim of our 2021 Lessons & Carols service is to lift up these lesserheard voices in a most special way.

Please join us for this beautiful service of candle-lighting, scripture, and choral music.

Christmas Flowers and Music

Notes from Recent Vestry Meetings

The October 19 Vestry meeting began with devotions led by Heather Kramer. In recognition of Indigenous Peoples Day, she read a Navajo prayer and then played a video of the prayer being recited in its original language.

The Consent Agenda, approving the minutes of the prior meeting and receiving a report from the Wardens, was approved.

Rev. D.'s Rector's Report began with thanks to the Vestry and congregation for the support shown to her and her family at the service of Installation. She also asked the Vestry to consider what can be done in the short term to strengthen the church's offerings for children, as Sunday School has not yet been able to reopen due to COVID-19 concerns.

Vestry members then split up into groups of two for one-on-one relational meetings, following guidelines provided by Rev. D. aimed at encouraging participants to communicate their personal stories, including their values and motivations.

Rev. D. then led the Vestry in an exercise to develop goals for the current program year. The group brainstormed several potential goals but did not attempt to finalize or vote on them. This will be an ongoing discussion.

One related issue raised during this discussion was the desire of some members to receive orientation training on the Vestry job description and process. Rev. D. agreed to assemble a handbook and review it at a future meeting.

Casey Rousseau provided a Treasurer's Report which showed a concerning shortfall in payments from parishioners of about \$50,000 on a year-to-date basis, a nearly 20% shortfall from the budgeted amount. This shortfall has not yet resulted in an operating deficit due to reduced spending, but there is a need for giving from parishioners to increase in order to keep the church on sound footing. In anticipation of the upcoming Annual Appeal, Casey will do more analysis to better understand what is causing this shortfall.

Mark MacGougan provided an update on the leasing of space on the second floor of the Parish House to IRIS – Integrated Refugee and Immigrant Services, which is in the process of moving into the former SIM office space. Because of the expanded need for refugee resettlement services this year they now plan to have six staff members there, a tight fit. They have proposed that Trinity lease them additional space consisting of the entry hall and living room of the vacant Parish House second floor apartment, neither currently in good condition. The proposal is that IRIS would lease the extra space as-is and, with the church's permission, make improvements, with the cost counting towards rent for this additional space. A motion authorizing Trinity to offer such an arrangement passed.

Mark added that a related item has come to our attention: The lease with IRIS must be approved by the Diocese under the ECCT process for "Real Estate Alienations or Encumbrances." Rev. D. is now beginning this multi-step process with the help of the Wardens.

Under Other Business, Rev. D. invited Vestry members to volunteer for the Announcement Time Welcome via an electronic sign-up site she has set up. The meeting concluded with "A Night Prayer" from the New Zealand Prayer Book.

The Trinity Vestry held its
November 16 meeting via Zoom.
The meeting opened with
devotions led by Rev. D., who
read a reflection by Howard
Thurman entitled "Reservoir,
Canal or Swamp?" and asked
Vestry members to consider its
implications for them.

The first order of business was approving the minutes of the prior meeting.

Rev. D.'s report started with her expressing excitement about the efforts by parishioners and others to help resettle a recently-arrived family from Afghanistan. She noted an increase in in-person church attendance the prior week and wondered if this would continue or if attendance would fluctuate for a while. She expressed hope that Sunday School in some form would have an opening event in December and reopen in earnest in January.

Vestry members then split up into groups of two for one-onone relational meetings.

There was a brief discussion of how Vestry meetings should be conducted. The consensus was that business meetings would continue via Zoom, but members would be encouraged to attend occasional development meetings in person. The December 21 meeting will be a Zoom business meeting, while the meeting on January 18 will be a development meeting focused on Relational Meeting Training and will be hybrid, with members encouraged to attend in person but able to attend through Zoom if necessary.

Casey Rousseau provided a Treasurer's Report which iterated concerns he expressed in his October report. Pledge income has been down throughout the pandemic and needs to be boosted for the church to be on secure footing for the future. November and December are usually good months for pledge income, so he expects the deficit to be reduced by year-end. Early returns from the Annual Appeal appear encouraging, but we need to keep the momentum going. The Executive Committee will be contacting parishioners whose pledges lapsed in recent years. This needs to be a pastoral call – not "Where is our money?" but "How are you doing?"

The Vestry discussed special offering designations for holidays, then voted to designate them as follows: Thanksgiving offering to FoodShare, Christmas offering to Open Hearth, Easter offering to American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem.

The Vestry also discussed options for restarting coffee hour. They agreed to a restart with no food – just coffee, tea and water – using disposable cups and encouraging social distancing. Vinnie will handle set-up, and Vestry members will oversee clean-up until a sign-up sheet can identify additional volunteers.

The Vestry discussed whether or not direct support for Trinity Academy should be included in the parish budget. The church currently provides a very significant in-kind donation in the form of free rent for the school's use of space in our buildings, and the Outreach Committee sometimes designates gifts to Trinity Academy. One option considered was the use of funds from the Doc Lane endowment. designated for the benefit of Hartford-area youth, to support one or more Trinity Academy student sponsorships. It was agreed to continue this discussion at another time.

Rev. D. asked for volunteers to assist in planning a Vestry retreat for sometime in the new year.

The meeting concluded with "A Night Prayer" from the New Zealand Prayer Book.

Coffee Hour Is Back!

Following the Vestry discussion mentioned above, coffee hour after the 10:00 a.m. service will return on November 28.

Beverages will be available, along with a chance to chat with Trinity friends old and new.

"Sanctuary Stitchers" Gathering January 8

Fall Updates from the Asylum Hill Neighborhood Association

Police Report: Officer Palmieri spoke about his work at local schools and at Sigourney Park. He's spending time at the corner of Laurel Street and Farmington Avenue with Officer Jimmy Barrett helping the homeless and those hanging at the corner as part of dealing with issues that get forgotten within a population that is often neglected.

***Remember to remove items from view inside your cars to lower the number of car break-ins.

Chief Thody gave an extensive presentation. His areas of concern are:

- Creating a safer Sigourney Park
- Quality of life issues (noise, drinking, loitering)
- Red light cameras useful or not?
- Scooters problems with use on sidewalks
- Neighborhood watch yes/no?
- Traffic calming methods
- Increased police presence

Community Court: Court is extremely busy, with lots of cases that backlogged due to COVID-19. You will start to see individuals performing community service as their cases get processed.

Comet Diner: The building is now on the National Park Preservation list. Work is continuing on getting the business open again.

Green Committee: Composters have been distributed to both Trinity Academy and Niles Garden and are now in use.

Emergency Relief Fund: Reported by Lynn Webber from the Village. The fund has the ability to give money to residents of Asylum Hill, with up to \$3000 available for rent, security deposits, unpaid bills, etc.

85 Sigourney Street: The building has been sold. The new buyers are soliciting ideas for usage via a needs assessment of the neighborhood.

The October Meeting was a presentation of a draft of the Strategic Plan for Asylum Hill. There will be eight task forces. They are:

- Arts and Culture
- Economic Development
- Employment
- Environmental and Green Initiatives
- Housing and Historic Preservation
- Human Services
- Public Safety
- Youth and Education

Each task force group presented its discussions. The steering committee was then to review the information and prepare it for presentation to a November 17 neighborhood stakeholders breakfast.
