When I was a kid, my brother and I would sometimes play with a ball that had half spheres arranged on the surface. The half spheres on the surface caused the ball to bounce in unpredictable ways when it was



thrown against a wall or bounced off of the floor. The unpredictability of the bounce increased the harder the ball was thrown, or the more spin was put on it when it was thrown. Although we didn't realize it, this kind of ball is sometimes used by athletes to improve reaction time and hand-eye coordination. It is often the case that when we play, we are developing entire sets of skills that we aren't even aware of. As kids, many of us practiced problem solving, creativity, co-operation, conflict resolution, and many other skills without us realizing it.

For many of us, the older we get, the less we play. I once invited someone to a game night and their very serious response was, "I don't play games." But, maybe this Advent and Christmas

season, there is an invitation to re-engage play. Do you incorporate play into your life these days? Play can take many different forms and have many different flavors, but I think that at its core, play is something that we do for no other purpose than enjoyment. No goals to reach. No purpose to fulfill. Just, delight.

Sometimes I think that the harder part is incorporating playfulness into our purposeful endeavors and into the difficult parts of our lives. When Michelle gave her presentation on the music of Haydn, I found myself wondering if he sat down and said to himself, "I'm going to write music that has playful elements in it" – or did he carry such a spirit of delight in his writing that it came out as playfulness? It's one thing to find delight in doing purposeful work that you enjoy, but what about playful delight in the hardest times of our lives? When I think back over some of the more difficult patches of my life and imagine someone trying to talk to me about playfulness, I feel the skepticism and even anger that would have likely been my response. Playfulness during the most difficult time in my life? Playfulness when it sometimes feels like I'm just watching my life spin out of my control? Playfulness in the midst of the wearying hustle and bustle that often characterizes our lives? Playfulness?!? Absolutely!

Perhaps the middle of the hustle and bustle is exactly where and when we need play and playfulness the most. In those moments of finding delight even in the midst of difficulty and despair, we may not realize it, but we are building our ability to receive God's sustaining love and share it with those around us.

What would it mean for you to have a playful Advent? What would it look like for you to have a playful Christmastide? I look forward to hearing your stories of seeking playful delight in this season.

Two from Trinity Elected as Delegates to 2024 General Convention of the Episcopal Church

The annual convention of the Episcopal Church in Connecticut, which met in early November at the Connecticut Convention Center, elected four lay delegates and four clergy delegates to represent our diocese at the next triennial General Convention of the Episcopal Church, to be held in Louisville, Kentucky, in July of 2024. (The last General Convention was held in 2022, postponed from the scheduled 2021 dates because of COVID.)

TWO of the four lay delegates – Marsha McCurdy Adell and Elizabeth Rousseau – are from Trinity Church, Hartford! Marsha, who was co-chair of the Bishop Transition Committee which oversaw the process of selecting our new diocesan bishop, was also elected to serve on the diocese's Commission on Ministry at the November diocesan convention. Elizabeth is no stranger to General Convention, as she has previously attended as a youth delegate. Congratulations to Marsha and Elizabeth!

Notes from the September and October Vestry Meetings

Rev. D. has made a practice of having Vestry members take turns leading opening prayer and meditation as well as having small group "check ins" to begin every Vestry meeting. These practices have made it possible for the Vestry to get to know one another on a deeper level, as well as to prepare members to approach meetings with love and support for one another and the work to be done. The Vestry is thrilled about being able to meet both in person and online to provide flexibility and comfort for our members.

The highlights of **the September meeting** started with the Rector's report celebrating our Homecoming Sunday and Vinnie Pacileo's return to work, reviewing janitorial topics, and updating the Vestry on illness and loss experienced by parish members with a request that the Vestry keep these members in prayer. The return of Godly Play and the addition of four new members to the Choir School were celebrated.

The Stewardship campaign is being led by Warden Tim Watt this year. It was suggested that stewardship be made a year round effort led by non Vestry members, as was done in the past at Trinity, with a service term consisting of one year to learn, one year to lead, and one year to teach. Current Vestry members will be needed to get the process started. It was planned to hold a brainstorming session regarding this approach at the October Vestry retreat. It was also suggested that stewardship ongoing efforts include a thank you to parish members for all their support and mission work.

Lastly, the Vestry worked with the new Vestry Resource Guide, focusing on the Vestry Visioning section.

The **October meeting** was full of exciting plans and sharing of moments of joy as well as discussion of ongoing efforts to get some Trinity programs to continue.

The Vestry heard from Marsha McCurdy Adell, who expressed great joy at the installation of our new Bishop, the Right Reverend Jeffrey Mello, and the Vestry thanked Marsha for the contributions she made to the Bishop's search and selection as a member of the diocese's Bishop Transition Committee.

Rev. D.'s Rector's Report began with an update on her employee review process as well as a discussion of some mechanical issues requiring rework that Vinnie is managing. She expressed gratitude for the strong participation of parish members in the funerals of Margaret Moore and Ginny Catanzaro and shared thanks from Jannel Thomas for the support of the church after the passing of her mother, Pollyann Thomas.

Financial reports from the Treasurers have been streamlined to make them easier to understand. Casey Rousseau spent time explaining Trinity's current financial picture, and the group spent time using the Vestry Resource guide to learn more about best financial, administrative and governance practices, including checks and balances to ensure proper financial oversight of all spending.

Although Godly Play has restarted, the full Church School has not resumed. Kate Byroade has stepped away from her Church School leadership position, and Warden Leslyn Clark remarked that the church needs the Vestry's help with support for restarting the Church School. There are two parishioners who are considering supporting this effort. In addition, a Governance working group will be created to focus on the revival of ministry quadrants, documenting their processes and method of leadership and working with the Vestry, as well as understanding how best to maintain their focus in the future. Jacqui Lucier will lead this working group with Leslyn Clark, and will be soliciting members to support their efforts.

The plan for the Vestry Retreat to be held later in the month at Trinity Retreat Center in West Cornwall was shared, and members learned that the weekend will be a time for them to get to know one another better, to spend time in prayer and Bible study, as well has to have brainstorming sessions on topics to lead the Vestry efforts for the remainder of its members' current terms and beyond.
