# Lenten Message from Presiding Bishop Michael Curry

Clarence Jorden of the Koinonia Movement many years ago wrote this:

Jesus founded the most revolutionary movement in human history, a movement built on the unconditional love of God for the world, and the mandate to those who follow to live that love. The season of Lent is upon us. It is a season of making a renewed commitment to participate and be a part of the movement of Jesus in this world. You can see some of that in the Gospel lesson for the first Sunday of Lent where Luke says that after the Baptism of Jesus he went into the wilderness, there to be tempted of Satan.

After the Baptism. Baptism is the sacrament of commitment to the Jesus Movement. It is to be washed, if you will, in the love and the reality of God, and to emerge from that great washing as one whose life is dedicated to living that love in the world.

In this season of Lent, we take some time to focus on what that means for our lives, whether it is as simple as giving up chocolate candy or as profound as taking on a commitment to serve the poor or to serve others in some new way. Whatever it is, let that something be something that helps you participate in the movement of God's love in this world following in the footsteps of Jesus.

And the truth is, the fact that Jesus was baptized and began that movement in the world and immediately found himself tempted by the devil is an ever-present reminder that this movement is not without struggle. It is not easy. The truth is, this movement is difficult. It's hard work. It's work of following Jesus to the cross. And it's work of following Jesus through the cross to the Resurrection. To new life. And new possibility. That is our calling. That is the work of the movement. To help this world move from what is often the nightmare of the world itself into the dream that God intends.

So I pray that this Lent, as they used to say many years ago, might be the first day of the rest of your life. It might be a new day for this world.

God love you. God bless you. Have a blessed Lent, a glorious Easter, and you keep the faith.

People It is right to give God thanks and praise.


Celebrant It is right to praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which you have redeemed us

THE GOSPEL: Luke 19:28-40

After telling a parable to the crowd at Jericho, Jesus went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, saying, "Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it.'" So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, "Why are you untying the colt?" They said, "The Lord needs it." Then they brought it to Jesus; and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!"





#### POSTCOMMUNION PRAYER

Celebrant Let us pray.
All Loving God,

We give you thanks for restoring us in your image and nourishing us with spiritual food in the Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood. Now send us forth a people, forgiven, healed, renewed; that we may proclaim your love to the world and come in the risen life of Christ our Savior. Amen.

The customary responses before and after the Gospel are omitted. The congregation remains seated until the arrival at Golgotha, when all stand or kneel. At the 10:00 a.m. service, a dramatic reading of the Passion is offered by the members of our Confirmation class. There may be minor variations in the text.

Narrator The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Saint Luke.

Now the festival of Unleavened Bread, which is called the Passover, was near. The chief priests and the scribes were looking for a way to put Jesus to death, for they were afraid of the people. Then Satan entered into Judas called Iscariot, who was one of the twelve; he went away and conferred with the chief priests and officers of the temple police about how he might betray him to them. They were greatly pleased and agreed to give him money. So he consented and began to look for an opportunity to betray him to them when no crowd was present.

Then came the day of Unleavened Bread, on which the Passover lamb had to be sacrificed. So Jesus sent Peter and John, saying,

"Go and prepare the Passover meal for us that we may eat it."

Narrator They asked him,

"Where do you want us to make preparations for it?"

"Listen," he said to them, "when you have entered the city, a man carrying a jar of water will meet you; follow him into the house he enters and say to the owner of the house, 'The

teacher asks you, "Where is the guest room, where I may eat the Passover with my disciples?" "He will show you a large room upstairs, already furnished. Make

preparations for us there."

Narrator So they went and found everything as he had told them; and they prepared the Passover

meal. When the hour came, he took his place at the table, and the apostles with him. He

said to them,

Jesus "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer; for I tell you, I will

not eat it until it is fulfilled in the kingdom of God."

Narrator Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he said,

Jesus "Take this and divide it among yourselves; for I tell you that from now on I will not drink

of the fruit of the vine until the kingdom of God comes."

Narrator Then he took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to

them, saying,

Jesus "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Narrator And he did the same with the cup after supper, saying,

*Jesus* "This cup that is poured out for you is the new covenant in my blood. But see, the one

who betrays me is with me, and his hand is on the table. For the Son of Man is going as it

has been determined, but woe to that one by whom he is betrayed!"

Narrator Then they began to ask one another, which one of them it could be who would do this. A

dispute also arose among them as to which one of them was to be regarded as the greatest.

But he said to them,



Iesus

"The kings of the Gentiles lord it over them; and those in authority over them are called benefactors. But not so with you; rather the greatest among you must become like the youngest, and the leader like one who serves. For who is greater, the one who is at the table or the one who serves? Is it not the one at the table? But I am among you as one who serves. You are those who have stood by me in my trials; and I confer on you, just as my Father has conferred on me, a kingdom, so that you may eat and drink at my table in my kingdom, and you will sit on thrones judging the twelve tribes of Israel. Simon, Simon, listen! Satan has demanded to sift all of you like wheat, but I have prayed for you that your own faith may not fail; and you, when once you have turned back, strengthen your brothers."

Narrator And Peter said to him,

"Lord, I am ready to go with you to prison and to death!"

Narrator Jesus said,

*Iesus* "I tell you, Peter, the cock will not crow this day, until you have denied three times that

you know me."

Narrator He said to them,

"When I sent you out without a purse, bag, or sandals, did you lack anything?"

Narrator They said,

All "No, not a thing."

Narrator He said to them,

*Iesus* "But now, the one who has a purse must take it, and likewise a bag. And the one who has

no sword must sell his cloak and buy one. For I tell you, this scripture must be fulfilled in me, 'And he was counted among the lawless'; and indeed what is written about me is being

fulfilled."

Narrator They said,

All "Lord, look, here are two swords."

Narrator He replied,

Iesus "It is enough."

Narrator He came out and went, as was his custom, to the Mount of Olives; and the disciples

followed him. When he reached the place, he said to them,

*Iesus* "Pray that you may not come into the time of trial."

Narrator Then he withdrew from them about a stone's throw, knelt down, and prayed,

*Tesus* "Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me; yet, not my will but yours be done."

Narrator Then an angel from heaven appeared to him and gave him strength. In his anguish he

prayed more earnestly, and his sweat became like great drops of blood falling down on the ground. When he got up from prayer, he came to the disciples and found them sleeping

because of grief, and he said to them,

"Why are you sleeping? Get up and pray that you may not come into the time of trial."

Narrator While he was still speaking, suddenly a crowd came, and the one called Judas, one of the

twelve, was leading them. He approached Jesus to kiss him; but Jesus said to him,

*Jesus* "Judas, is it with a kiss that you are betraying the Son of Man?"

Narrator When those who were around him saw what was coming, they asked,

*All* "Lord, should we strike with the sword?"

Narrator Then one of them struck the slave of the high priest and cut off his right ear. But Jesus

said,

*Jesus* "No more of this!"

Narrator And he touched his ear and healed him. Then Jesus said to the chief priests, the officers of

the temple police, and the elders who had come for him,

*Iesus* "Have you come out with swords and clubs as if I were a bandit? When I was with you

day after day in the temple, you did not lay hands on me. But this is your hour, and the

power of darkness!"

Narrator Then they seized him and led him away, bringing him into the high priest's house. But

Peter was following at a distance. When they had kindled a fire in the middle of the courtyard and sat down together, Peter sat among them. Then a servant-girl, seeing him

in the firelight, stared at him and said,

Servant "This man also was with him."

*Narrator* But he denied it, saying,

Peter "Woman, I do not know him."

Narrator A little later someone else, on seeing him, said,

Witness "You also are one of them."

Narrator But Peter said,
Peter "Man, I am not!"

Narrator Then about an hour later still another kept insisting,

Witness "Surely this man also was with him; for he is a Galilean."

Narrator But Peter said,

"Man, I do not know what you are talking about!"

Narrator At that moment, while he was still speaking, the cock crowed. The Lord turned and looked

at Peter. Then Peter remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said to him, "Before the cock crows today, you will deny me three times." And he went out and wept bitterly.

Now the men who were holding Jesus began to mock him and beat him; they also

blindfolded him and kept asking him,

All "Prophesy! Who is it that struck you?"

Narrator They kept heaping many other insults on him. When day came, the assembly of the elders

of the people, both chief priests and scribes, gathered together, and they brought him to

their council. They said,

All "If you are the Messiah, tell us."

Narrator He replied,





*Iesus* "If I tell you, you will not believe; and if I question you, you will not answer. But from

now on the Son of Man will be seated at the right hand of the power of God."

Narrator All of them asked,

All "Are you, then, the Son of God?"

Narrator He said to them,

Jesus "You say that I am."

Narrator Then they said,

"What further testimony do we need? We have heard it ourselves from his own lips!"

Narrator Then the assembly rose as a body and brought Jesus before Pilate. They began to accuse

him, saying,

All "We found this man perverting our nation, forbidding us to pay taxes to the emperor,

and saying that he himself is the Messiah, a king."

Narrator Then Pilate asked him,

*Pilate* "Are you the king of the Jews?"

Narrator He answered, Jesus "You say so."

Narrator Then Pilate said to the chief priests and the crowds, "I find no basis for an accusation against this man."

Narrator But they were insistent and said,

All "He stirs up the people by teaching throughout all Judea, from Galilee where he began

even to this place."

Narrator When Pilate heard this, he asked whether the man was a Galilean. And when he learned

that he was under Herod's jurisdiction, he sent him off to Herod, who was himself in Jerusalem at that time. When Herod saw Jesus, he was very glad, for he had been wanting to see him for a long time, because he had heard about him and was hoping to see him perform some sign. He questioned him at some length, but Jesus gave him no answer. The chief priests and the scribes stood by, vehemently accusing him. Even Herod with his soldiers treated him with contempt and mocked him; then he put an elegant robe on him, and sent him back to Pilate. That same day Herod and Pilate became friends with each

other; before this they had been enemies.

Pilate then called together the chief priests, the leaders, and the people, and said to them,

Pilate "You brought me this man as one who was perverting the people; and here I have

examined him in your presence and have not found this man guilty of any of your charges against him. Neither has Herod, for he sent him back to us. Indeed, he has done nothing to deserve death. I will therefore have him flogged and release him." Then they all shouted

out together,

All "Away with this fellow! Release Barabbas for us!"

Narrator This was a man who had been put in prison for an insurrection that had taken place in the

city, and for murder. Pilate, wanting to release Jesus, addressed them again; but they kept

shouting,

All "Crucify, crucify him!"

Narrator A third time he said to them,

"Why, what evil has he done? I have found in him no ground for the sentence of death; I

will therefore have him flogged and then release him."

Narrator But they kept urgently demanding with loud shouts that he should be crucified; and their

voices prevailed. So Pilate gave his verdict that their demand should be granted. He released the man they asked for, the one who had been put in prison for insurrection and

murder, and he handed Jesus over as they wished.

As they led him away, they seized a man, Simon of Cyrene, who was coming from the country, and they laid the cross on him, and made him carry it behind Jesus. A great number of the people followed him, and among them were women who were beating their

breasts and wailing for him. But Jesus turned to them and said,

*Iesus* "Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, but weep for yourselves and for your

children. For the days are surely coming when they will say, 'Blessed are the barren, and the wombs that never bore, and the breasts that never nursed.' Then they will begin to say to the mountains, 'Fall on us'; and to the hills, 'Cover us.' For if they do this when the

wood is green, what will happen when it is dry?"

Narrator Two others also, who were criminals, were led away to be put to death with him.

Please kneel or stand as you are able.

When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the

criminals, one on his right and one on his left. Then Jesus said,

Jesus "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing."

Narrator And they cast lots to divide his clothing. And the people stood by, watching; but the

leaders scoffed at him, saying,

"He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!"

Narrator The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, and saying,

Witness "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!"

Narrator There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews." One of the

criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying,

1st Criminal "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!"

Narrator But the other rebuked him, saying,

2nd Criminal "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? And we

indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but

this man has done nothing wrong."





Narrator Then he said,

2nd Criminal "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom."

He replied, Narrator

"Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise." *Iesus* 

It was now about noon, and darkness came over the whole land until three in the Narrator

afternoon, while the sun's light failed; and the curtain of the temple was torn in two.

Then Jesus, crying with a loud voice, said,

*Iesus* "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit."

Having said this, he breathed his last. (silence) When the centurion saw what had taken Narrator

place, he praised God and said,

"Certainly this man was innocent." Centurian

And when all the crowds who had gathered there for this spectacle saw what had taken Narrator

> place, they returned home, beating their breasts. But all his acquaintances, including the women who had followed him from Galilee, stood at a distance, watching these things.

> Now there was a good and righteous man named Joseph, who, though a member of the council, had not agreed to their plan and action. He came from the Jewish town of Arimathea, and he was waiting expectantly for the kingdom of God. This man went to

Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then he took it down, wrapped it in a linen cloth, and laid it in a rock-hewn tomb where no one had ever been laid. It was the day of Preparation, and the sabbath was beginning. The women who had come with him from Galilee followed, and they saw the tomb and how his body was laid. Then they returned,

and prepared spices and ointments.

On the sabbath they rested according to the commandment.
