An Art Exhibit Featuring Works by Trinity's Georges Annan-Kingsley

"Freedom Dreams," an exhibit of paintings, drawings and photographs by four talented local artists, all of whom arrived in the U.S. as refugees, is now on display at Hartford Public Library (Main Branch, 500 Main St.) Four vividly colored paintings by George Annan-Kingsley (Trinity Vestry member/parishioner) are included in the exhibit: "Hartford Downtown;" "Woman at the

Refugee Center;" "Queen Mothers; and Family."

Georges, a native of Cote d'Ivoire, began his artistic



career at the age of 14. His path led him to teaching, where at the University of Cote d'Ivoire he taught painting and sculpture for 20 years. After struggling with health issues, Georges moved to



Ghana to regain his strength. He was inspired by the brilliant colors of the native fruits in Ghana and began to paint them with renewed vigor.

"Freedom Dreams" employs art to represent the struggle the artists endured while fleeing oppression in their homelands.

Come Re-Discover Asylum Hill's *Secret Garden*

If you have not yet visited Trinity's Memorial Garden this summer to take advantage of this wonderful extension of Trinity's "place of welcome, hope, and healing," do not delay. Each day when the Garden is open, more of our neighbors are discovering to their delight, this new destination for a lunchtime walk, and to take the opportunity to relax and unwind.

Come see the recent manicuring improvements made by Enid Oberholtzer, Paul Cooper & crew last week. The garden section with the water fountain has been completely weeded, and the plants were *tamed* and groomed. Mulch was put down. And, eureka! A plaque identifying the "Samuel's Tree" memorial was unearthed, and can now be seen and read, restoring the honor intended by its donors. Samuel's tree is a memorial celebrating the life of Samuel Naidoo, a former Trinity Assistant Sexton (1941-2007).

You do not have to come to the garden to "host." However, the garden can only remain open when someone is present to unlock the gate and remain in the garden until a replacement arrives or the gate is locked.

There are many time slots available for willing hosts, Monday through Friday, 10:00 a.m.–2:00 p.m or 10:00 a.m.–12:00 p.m. or 12:00 p.m. – 2:00 p.m. It is the easiest hosting job you will ever have. Anyone interested in volunteering to serve as "host" during the hours the garden is open is encouraged to either sign-up in Goodwin Hall, contact Pam in the office, or, better yet, just come to the Garden. If the gate is locked, let someone in the parish office know, so it can be unlocked. If the gate is open, just come in and ... "stay and keep watch with Me."

Civil Discourse Workshop Christ Church Cathedral

On Wednesday, September 5, from 9:00 a.m.– 5:00 p.m., the Episcopal Church Office of Government Relations, Communications Coordinator and Office Manager, Alan Yarborough has been invited to Christ Church Cathedral, Hartford to offer a training course in Civil Discourse.

Civil discourse is engagement in conversation intended to enhance understanding.

Rabbi Steve Gutow, speaking at the Episcopal Church's event "Civil Discourse in America", remarked that, "civility is simply demonstrating respect for the dignity of our fellow humans—even those humans with whom we have sharp disagreement. Civility is allowing others to speak, and having the humility to admit that we may have something to learn. Civility favors truth over cheap gain, and patience over knee-jerk judgment."

The novel, which won the Pulitzer Prize for fiction in 1976, explores the long friendship between Charlie Citrine, a young man with an intense passion for literature, and the great poet Von Humboldt Dleisher. Humboldt dies at a time when Charlie's life is in a shambles— but he leaves a legacy that may turn everything around.
