#### Life Together at Trinity

This is my last *Voice* article as your Rector. Perhaps recalling the signs about which the disciples asked Jesus, Debbie jokes that she'll believe I'm retired when I don't have "Voice Deadline" on my calendar. So before I write anything else, I want to thank Kathie Wilson for her absolute faithfulness to this congregation in planning, editing, writing and producing *The Voice* over these many years. Kathie continues to keep us informed and tuned in to events that help weave together the fabric of our common life.



I began naming this column *Life Together* early on in my ministry here after re-reading Dietrich Bonhoeffer's book by the same title. He believed that Christian community can only exist when Jesus is at the very center of every aspect of community life. Christian community, he wrote, is not only a human ideal, it is already a divine reality. It is not, he writes, "an ideal which we must realize; it is rather a reality created by God in Christ in which we may participate." Jesus calls the community into being, not vice versa. And that is the type of community Debbie and I have experienced here at Trinity.

As I reflect back on our 15+ years here, "Christian Community" is the aspect that I will remember and cherish forever. From my first telephone interview with Kate Steven in the summer of 2003, I felt the presence of Christ at the center of community life at Trinity. We see Jesus in the face of each other, in the faces of those we serve, in the faces of those we welcome and, yes, in the lives of those whom we may never meet. It is grounded in Christian hospitality that is part of the DNA of this congregation.

Just about every Christian church in the universe has a sign somewhere that proclaims, "All Welcome." In my experience, that often translates to "All Welcome *to be like us.*" At Trinity, we have experienced a community that welcomes all of God's children as God has made them, welcoming them to join our community not to *become like us* but to *become most fully who God desires for them to be*. I like to think that each of us is always "becoming" – being led to grow into God's dream for each of us – until we draw our last breath. As your pastor, it has been my goal that we strive together, support one another and learn from one another as together we work on becoming that divinely inspired albeit sometimes messy Body of Christ that Bonhoeffer described as "Christian Community."

"Now you are the body of Christ, and individually members of it," St. Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 12:27. Just as each of us is always "becoming" during our lifetimes, so too each Christian community must continue to evolve in order to remain a dynamic and vibrant Body of Christ. New members come into the community, bringing new life, new vitality, a variety of gifts and experiences that, really, are the breath of the Holy Spirit. Inevitably, other members complete their journey on this earth, or move on to continue

### February 10: Opening a Season of Racial Healing

In accordance with a resolution of the 2018 Diocesan Convention, Trinity will join other congregations in the Episcopal Church in Connecticut in observing a "Season of Racial Healing, Justice and Reconciliation" beginning with services on Sunday, February 10.

Bishops Ian Douglas and Laura Ahrens write: "Our recent Convention's action was comprehensive and called for specific actions... The goals of the Season are to introduce foundational concepts, language, and tools to help encourage and enable congregations to begin opening hearts and minds; to acknowledge the reality of white supremacy and bias against people of color in our society; and to awaken Episcopalians in Connecticut to the need for concerted action to address the ongoing injustice of the racial divide. . . We recognize this is work many of us have already engaged in various ways for a long time. We also recognize that while the resolution invites us into this work for a minimum of two years, we will be committed to this work for the rest of our lives."

Trinity, one of the ECCT parishes that have made significant effort on the subject of racial justice, is poised to be a congregational leader in the work ahead. Fr. Don has been working with a group of parishioners and others engaged in this work to plan the sermon on the 10<sup>th</sup>; the 10 a.m. service will be followed by a town hall-style meeting. Please join in as we continue Trinity's efforts to follow Jesus' call "that we all may be one."

#### Capital Campaign for Mission Update


We're happy to say that the Campaign for Trinity continues to gain momentum! The best measure of this is our pledges received, which recently surpassed 50% of our goal. Other progress includes:

- A beautiful, new version of our case statement document, with graphic design donated by former parishioner Rhode Van Gessel.
- Establishment of a Capital Works Committee to review and prioritize projects.
- Experienced project manager, Dave Desmarais, agreeing to be Clerk of the Works to oversee projects.
- Active planning in progress for the Public Launch on February 12.

Our one regret at this point is that we're behind schedule in our plans for all parishioners to be visited. #### WHAT HAPPENS NEXT?

For the moment, most of our attention is focused on Father Don's retirement on March 3. There will be an opportunity to celebrate, remember and say goodbye (see Page 3). You'll hear more about that in the coming weeks.

You may also be wondering, though, what happens after Fr. Don's last day with us. We don't have all the answers yet, but here's what we do know at this point:



- The Bishops and ECCT staff are aware of our transition, and the Rev. Canon Lee Ann Tolzmann, the ECCT Canon for Mission Leadership, along with Bishop Laura Ahrens, will be working with us as we navigate these new waters.
- The Wardens and Vestry are working with Father Don to arrange short-term coverage so we'll have a priest available until our "official" interim priest comes.
- The Rev. Canon Lee Ann Tolzmann will be our guest preacher on April 7, and we will have only one service that day, at 9:30 a.m., so that she can meet with the entire congregation to talk with us about the process of finding our next rector (see Page 12).
- We expect to have an interim rector joining us by early summer.
- A search committee will be formed as soon as possible after Father Don's departure.
- We'll continue to get some help from the volunteer clergy who regularly lead worship and are part of the fabric of our congregational life, and we may see some new faces in our chancel and pulpit.
- There will be a priest available for pastoral care, as there always has been. Call the church office at 860-527-8133. If the office is closed, leave a message in mailbox 1, and a priest on call will contact you.
- All of our ongoing ministries will continue to function under the leadership of our Quadrant Liaisons, supported by Vestry and the wardens.
- The church office will continue to be open Monday through Thursday from 9 to 3, and will be staffed by Barbara Roos, Fran Times-Mack, and our office volunteers.

Treasurer Janet Wilkinson and Assistant Treasurer Casey Rousseau presented a proposed budget for 2019 based on past experience of income and expenses. It was reviewed in detail and adjusted by the full Vestry. Final budget approval is done at the December meeting, when more information has been received from pledges and outside vendors.

The December 18th meeting opened with devotions by Father Don. He used "Dwelling in the Word," a format for reflecting on a passage of scripture which is being used at the beginning of all diocesan meetings.

The Outreach Team reported that ten people attended the first meeting on Fr. Ben's mission projects initiative. Anyone in the congregation with an idea for outreach or mission projects is encouraged to bring their ideas to this newly formed group, which will begin meeting more regularly in January. The Outreach Team is working on providing scholarships for young people in Tanzania, a continuation and expansion of a long-term ministry. Continuing efforts such as Loaves and Fishes and Feeding in the Park are thriving, and the Outreach Team also provided a Holiday Store for Trinity Academy students once again.

The Property Team is exploring improvements to Trinity's signage, especially on Farmington Avenue.

The Wardens reported on the ongoing ministries of the congregation, including the Capital Campaign, the Choir School, and

Trinity Academy. The Campaign for Trinity continues to meet with success, with \$300,600 pledged as of the meeting date. The public launch of the campaign will take place on February 12.

The Trinity Academy board of trustees is working to improve the financial stability of the Academy. The academic sponsorship program initiated this year is going well, with one grade fully sponsored and another grade 90% sponsored.

The Rector reported that he had sent a letter to the congregation announcing that his final Sunday at Trinity will be March 3, 2019. He also reported on the current staffing of the church office. Barbara Roos, who has been working about 10 hours per week as the administrator for the Campaign for Trinity, was available and willing to take on some of the Assistant to the Rector's duties on a part-time, interim basis following the departure of Pam Haddad on December 14.

The treasurers reported that they had made several adjustments to the proposed 2019 budget based on new information from the diocese about the cost of several services, including property/liability insurance rates and audit requirements. They also added a contingency fund to the budget, as recommended by diocesan financial leadership, and proposed increasing pay rates for Trinity's hourly workers to move them to \$14.25 per hour. The budget was reviewed and discussed, and was approved by unanimous voice vote.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:47 p.m.

#### Eversource Project Upgrades Completed

If you've been at Trinity during the week recently, you may have noticed various contractors at work on the comprehensive upgrade to our lighting fixtures as well as the heating and cooling systems in several parts of the building, plans for which had been announced in recent issues of *The Voice*. These upgrades, which were approved by the Vestry and will save us thousands of dollars each year on our natural gas and electricity bills, are now complete.

In accordance with the energy assessment conducted last year by Eversource, the air conditioning units in the office wing have been replaced by three heat exchanger units which serve five rooms on the ground floor and two on the second floor; these cooling units also have heat pumps which allow just one area to be heated when that is all the heat that is needed (e.g., in the

case of an evening meeting). The new heating and cooling system in the kitchen has also been installed and is operational, and provides hot water as well as heat and air conditioning. Electrical lighting in all areas of our buildings except the sanctuary has now been upgraded to lighting which is much more energy efficient and in many places provides better light as well.

The new lighting, which includes the exterior lights which illuminate our buildings at night, will save significant energy and will also lower maintenance costs, as the new LED bulbs last much longer than the bulbs previously in use. (Lighting upgrades to the sanctuary will be part of the work accomplished through the Capital Campaign.) We hope you'll admire and enjoy these new improvements, as well as the improvements they will generate in the annual budget.

### Compline To Be Offered On Sundays in Lent

A service of Compline will be sung at Trinity Church at 8:00 p.m. each Sunday beginning March 10, the First Sunday in Lent, and running through the Fifth Sunday in Lent, April 7. These services will be sung by the Compline Schola, a group of singers from Trinity and elsewhere who enjoy singing this beautiful service.

The last of four services in the Anglican Daily Office, Compline includes a confession, psalms, Scripture, the Lord's Prayer, and collects asking for God's protection during the coming night. The *Nunc dimittis* follows the Scripture passage.

Our Advent Compline series was very well received; Trinity's members and friends will now have the opportunity to enrich their observance of Lent by joining the Schola for this prayerful and reflective service. All are welcome. The Sigourney Street doors (only) will be open at 7:50 for those attending.

#### Ben Wyatt To Lead Wednesday Evening Series

Father Ben Wyatt has agreed to lead our mid-week Lenten study series, which will begin on Wednesday evening, March 13. Each session will start with a pizza supper (from 6:00-7:00 p.m.) and then continue with teaching and discussion at 7:00; the program will end at 8:00 p.m. This year's series title and topic will be announced soon, but the series is sure to be an engaging and meaningful addition to your observance of Lent.

#### Campaign For Trinity: In Case You Were Wondering . . .

The process of meeting with Trinity parishioners about their participation in The Campaign for Trinity has provided many wonderful opportunities for sharing our common life together and our visions for the future. Early meetings have been extraordinarily promising, and have yielded several questions we thought other folks might have, so here they are:

Question: Why did the Vestry decide to hire a Campaign Consultant, a Campaign Administrator, and produce a promotional video? Couldn't we have done those things in-house, on our own?

Answer: A little history is important to answer this question. Trinity has had three distinct capital campaigns over the past 20 years prior to **The Campaign for Trinity**: One in the late 1990s to complete the Memorial Garden, one in 2004 to refurbish the stained glass, and one in 2008-2009 to replace portions of our slate roof. Each of these campaigns was focused on a single project, and each of them was conceived, planned and carried out by volunteers from within the parish. Of the three, only the first campaign to complete the Memorial Garden came close to meeting its goal. The latter two raised only a fraction of the goals, with the remainder coming from loans or the endowment.

Unlike these prior campaigns, **The Campaign for Trinity** addresses a great number of building issues that are important to address at this time: fire and safety systems, for example, that do not meet current safety codes and fall far short of the security that modern technology can provide; replacement of the present heating system in the church to realize significant savings on utility costs and energy usage that will pay for themselves over a relatively short term; lighting and flooring improvements in the church that will make the space more user-friendly and improve its appeal to both worshippers and outside performance groups who wish to rent the space.

Given the complexity of this campaign and the variety of building issues we are trying to address, coupled with Trinity's track record in prior homegrown campaigns, the Vestry decided in 2017 to hire Partners for Sacred Places to serve as our campaign consultant and to follow their recommendations.

Question: It seems like the bulk of the projected work is on building infrastructure that people can't see. Why aren't there more inspiring "visible" projects included in the scope of work?

**Answer:** Everybody was hoping that there would be more priority for "exciting" and "high profile" projects. The fact is that the results of the architectural study pointed out the priority for updating "systems" that are in some cases decades out of date and no longer serving their intended purpose. There are important elements of the plans that include aesthetic and comfort improvements, but these have been placed lower on the priority scale in order to address fire and safety work that must come first.

Question: Who is going to supervise the work when it begins?

Answer: Ultimately, the Vestry is responsible for overseeing the scope and sequence of the work and approving all aspects of construction. The Vestry is appointing a subcommittee of the Vestry and the Property Team to focus on work related to the capital campaign. We have hired Mr. David Desmarais, former property manager for the Episcopal Church in Connecticut, as Clerk of the Works. He brings extensive experience in management of church construction projects and has agreed to work at an hourly rate to coordinate the work of architects, identifying prospective contractors, soliciting and choosing bids, and carrying out the actual work to satisfactory completion. He will work with the rest of the Trinity staff, the Vestry and the management subcommittee on the timing and implementation of all aspects of the campaign projects.

Question: Once the work is completed, what are the plans for ongoing maintenance of our buildings?

**Answer:** It needs to be stressed that the need for the work of the capital campaign *is not* a failure to provide regular maintenance – it is primarily the need to replace outdated and outmoded systems that no longer adequately protect our property and the people who use it. The Trinity Investment Committee coordinates with the Vestry in setting aside a percentage of our annual operating budget for maintenance contingencies and ongoing upkeep of all systems.


