# Life Together at Trinity

#### The Free Gift

Two weeks ago, Bishop Drew preached a wonderful sermon that drew our attention to an often-ignored verse from the 5th chapter of Romans. Comparing the gift of Jesus the Christ to the sin of Adam and Eve, Paul writes in verse 15: "The free gift is not like the trespass." Bishop Drew explained:

**THE** Rather than enmity with God, which trespass brings, the free gift brings peace with God. We're flooded with grace . . . More, through this free gift, love, the greatest gift is poured into our hearts - poured into our hearts - through the Holy Spirit, which also has been given (freely) to us.

I was still pondering that sermon while Debbie and I were blessed to escape the New England cold for nine days in Florida. One of my favorite pastimes while there is going to Englewood Beach, where one can find shark teeth washed up on the sand. I love it – it's mindless.

What I noticed during this last trip is that there are two basic techniques for looking for shark teeth. My own method is to walk along the water line on the wet sand and look for the teeth that wash up with each wave. The other technique involves purchasing or making a basket – some are metal, some are made of wood – at the end of a long handle. (Given the average age of folks on the beach, they are also commonly used as canes . . .) These folks will wade out into the water and dredge a basket full of whatever comes up. Then they go back to the beach, dump the contents of the basket, and painstakingly look for shark teeth (or whatever else they are looking for that day) amongst the contents.

Having tried both techniques, I can tell you that I find more just walking along the beach than I ever have lugging the baskets of sand up the beach.

And I realized that my walks along the beach, picking up whatever the Gulf of Mexico's waves happen to wash up on the land, provide a wonderful metaphor for the free gift from God in Jesus Christ. We Christians often work so hard trying to find Jesus. We forget that God has first given this free gift to us, and God looks for us. All we have to do is keep our eyes open and be present to receive the gift, recognizing Jesus' presence in every moment of every day.

May these remaining days of Lent be a time for you to remain open to the near presence of Jesus so that, having journeyed with him through his passion and death, we may more joyfully receive the gift of the Resurrected Christ on Easter.

# Partners for Sacred Places – Phase II

Back in 2014 the Vestry unanimously voted to engage the national organization Partners for Sacred Places in a study of our congregation. The results of the study, which were given to the parish in May 2015 and distributed to all members of the congregation at that time, had many good things to say about Trinity Church. The PSP staff provided the leadership with suggestions for goals to be addressed through the end of 2016.

On April 4 at 7:30 p.m., the Vestry and the Property Team will hold a special joint meeting with Gianfranco Grande, Senior Vice President of PSP, for conversation on Trinity's progress in response to the PSP report and to make recommendations for next steps, which may include considering the desirability of conducting a capital campaign. This meeting will be for information only. As with all Vestry meetings, the meeting is open to parishioners.

PSP began nearly 30 years ago as a group devoted to preserving historic sacred buildings such as churches and synagogues, with the goal of assisting the congregation – if there still was one – in converting all or part of the buildings to other uses. In the past 10 years, they have partnered with the Lilly Foundation to work with parishes owning historic worship spaces to engage in congregational development work in conjunction with preservation work.

The Vestry plans to discuss what they learn on April 4 at its regular meeting on Tuesday, April 18, at 7:15 p.m. in the Library.

# Maundy Thursday Service To Feature Agape Dinner

This year, Trinity's observance of Maundy Thursday, which falls on April 13, will recall the events of the Last Supper in a unique service.

Recalling that Jesus' institution of the sacrament of Holy Eucharist occurred at an actual meal, our worship that evening will include supper as part of the celebration of Holy Eucharist. The meal itself will be prepared by Trinity parishioners offering the exact same meal that they serve to the guests at Loaves and Fishes each month. The meal will tie us spiritually with our brothers and sisters at Loaves and Fishes, and remind us of the sacredness of breaking bread together, whether at church or in our homes.

We will also remember Jesus' selfgiving act of washing the feet of his disciples. The service of having our own feet washed or washing the feet of our brothers and sisters reminds us of the lesson that Jesus taught Peter that evening: that no one is too important to be a servant to others, and that we ought not be too proud to submit to the gracious gift of others. All who wish to participate in this ceremony will have an opportunity to do so, while those who choose not to may either sit quietly or join in the singing of a hymn.

Join your fellow parishioners of Trinity as we observe the feast of the Lord's Supper and foot washing, and consider bringing a friend or another family. The service will begin at 6:30 p.m. in the church and conclude between 8 and 8:30 p.m.

# Search Begins for Permanent Organist / Music Director

It has now been approximately eight months since Trinity moved from employing a full-time Director of Music Ministries to a half-time position.

All who are involved in the leadership of our music ministries – clergy, choir members, leaders and staff – knew that this would be a big transition for us, and so we intentionally called Jun Lee as an *Interim* Director of Music Ministries at a time when he was at a transition in his career – about to complete his degree – and we at Trinity could use this time to learn how to adapt to the new reality of having a part-time minister of music.

The really good news is that these eight months have been deeply rewarding: We have been blessed with a bright, talented and faithful Interim Director in Jun Lee, and we have learned how to distribute mostly to volunteers much of the administrative burden formerly borne by our full-time Precentor. And so, armed with our new-found understandings, we feel now is the time to move to hire a *permanent part-time* Organist and Director of Music Ministries.

As of March 10, the position has been posted with the American Guild of Organists, the Association of Anglican Musicians, the Royal School of Church Music in America, and The Episcopal Church in Connecticut as well as on the Trinity website. Remaining true to the process we agreed to from the start, Jun Lee is both invited and encouraged to apply for the permanent position to be considered with other candidates.

Fr. Don has appointed a committee of Vestry members, choir members, worship leaders, Choir School Board members and others representing the broad diversity of our congregation to review resumes and interview prospective candidates. The interview process will include having the most promising candidates work with both of our choirs and also present a live audition.

Applications are due April 17, and it is expected that the process will be completed by mid to late May. Present plans call for the permanent Organist and Director of Music Ministries to begin no later than August 1.

### **Book Group To Discuss Toni Morrison Novel**



Hartford's 34<sup>th</sup> Annual Foodshare Walk Against Hunger to raise awareness and funds to help hungry people in Greater Hartford will step off at 2:00 p.m. on Sunday, May 7. Many Trinity parishioners and friends have participated in the Walk in the past, and you are encouraged to join in again this year to help fight hunger in the Hartford area.

The Walk Against Hunger is the largest event of its kind in Connecticut. Proceeds benefit local families, children and seniors in need of food. Foodshare partners with 300 local programs – food pantries, community kitchens and shelters – to meet the needs of our hungry neighbors.

The Walk itself is less than two miles long, and is family-friendly and lots of fun!

Date: Sunday, May 7

**Time:** 12:30 p.m. check-in; walk begins at 2:00 p.m.

**Place:** Liam E. McGee Memorial Park, 140 Garden Street, Hartford (the former Connecticut Mutual site)

**Parking:** Free parking is available at 690 Asylum Avenue (the grounds of The Hartford). You can also park in the Trinity Church lot and walk over.

# River of Life: May 31 – July 9 Connecticut River Pilgrimage

The six Episcopal dioceses in the New England Province are sponsoring a Connecticut River Pilgrimage from May 31 to July 9 of this year.

The idea of a pilgrimage along the Connecticut River, paddling from the river's source to the sea, arose at the 2015 Advent Retreat of the Bishops of Province One (New England) with the leadership of Bishop Rob Hirschfeld of New Hampshire. Coordination and staffing for the forty-day pilgrimage are being provided by Kairosearth and Jo Brooks.

A core group of "river pilgrims" will journey the full length of the river, being joined by "daily pilgrims" as they traverse individual stretches/ communities, and by "pilgrims in prayer" for those who aren't able to paddle along or join in events but want to participate in the forty-day spiritual practices that correspond with the pilgrimage dates.

Locally organized, shore-based, events will draw attention to the beauty and challenges – ecological, social, economic, and spiritual – along the waterway. People of all faiths, beliefs, and paths are welcome for any/all of the pilgrimage.

The pilgrimage is scheduled to be in Hartford on the evening of July 3, departing on the morning of July 4. Fr. Don has been Trinity's delegate on the planning committee, along with clergy from Good Shepherd and Christ Church Cathedral. The plan is for the 20 pilgrims making

the full journey to be housed at Good Shepherd overnight, with both evening and morning events planned on the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup>. Trinity and the other Hartford churches are being asked to assist in providing some form of hospitality – this is still in the planning stages.

A New Relationship with Creation

Key Scripture Passages: Jesus Calms the Storm (Mark 4 and parallels), Jesus Walks on Water (Mark 6 and parallels)

# June 24 – July 1: Brattleboro, VT to Springfield, MA

Theme:

Drinking from Our Divine Source *Key Scripture Passage:* Streams of Living Water (John 4)

### July 1 – July 9: Springfield, MA to Long Island Sound

Theme:

Transformation and Resurrection

Key Scripture Passages: The Wedding Feast of Cana (John 2), The New Heavens and New Earth (Revelation 21), The Resurrection (John 20 and parallels)

# News from AHNA (Asylum Hill Neighborhood Association)

### **Police Report:**

Panhandling remains a big problem at the I-84 exit ramps to Sigourney Street and Sisson Avenue. Overall crime is down. Always be aware of your surroundings when on a cell phone, as there is still a lot of phone stealing occurring.

#### I-84:

Ongoing discussions are being held on possible designs, and forums soliciting input from citizens are still taking place. Proposals for a new transit hub in Asylum Hill are being considered.

#### **Anti-blight:**

A survey of blighted properties is underway. When that has been completed, there will be discussions in all NRZs to see where to start eliminating blight in each area.

### Mark Twain Library Branch:

The new branch opened inside West Middle School on March 1. Hours are limited to Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 1:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. Once more staff are available hours may change. The only complaint so far is the lack of parking. Discussions with neighboring businesses may change that.

#### **NINA (Northside Institutions Neighborhood Alliance):**

This group is looking to rehab two properties on Sigourney Street directly across from Trinity, a single home and a three-family home. The group is also considering developing property on the corner of Forest Street and Farmington Avenue.

#### City of Hartford:

Call 311 to report potholes. Individuals are encouraged to report noise complaints and quality of life issues such as loitering, noise, illegal parking.

#### **Welcoming Committee:**

This group plans to develop leaflets intended to create an environment of support for refugees and immigrants. The leaflets will contain information on what's available in the area.

#### **Hartford Decides:**

Dates are being determined for voting on which projects will divide the \$250,000 available city-wide.
