Down the Highway of Transition with a GPS

People once put plastic statuettes of Jesus or the Virgin or St. Christopher on the dashboards of their cars. As a boy, I was always skeptical about their efficacy; I once remarked that the assistant priest at our parish might be wiser to put his faith in seat belts. Now, ironically, instead of a pious-looking figurine I've got a GPS device.

Don't get me wrong; I love technology. Up to a point, anyway. My GPS sports bright colors, zooms in and out, and highlights the route for me. And it's voice-activated! I say in my sternest English-teacher voice, "Voice command!" and a pleasant-sounding female voice replies, "Say a command." If only my students were so compliant. And then my little GPS dutifully directs me to my destination.

Well, usually. My GPS is a little hard of hearing. Sometimes I have to shout repeatedly to get her attention: "Voice command. Voice command! VOICE COMMAND!" I can feel people in the cars in the next lane staring at me. She garbles my instructions. I say, "Find Trinity Church." She seriously replies, "Did you say, 'Polish Pizza Hut'?" She gets confused by things like detours, road construction, and accidents. Coming home from Cape Cod one time she stubbornly insisted I drive the wrong way down a one-way street. Another time she insisted on guiding me back towards the accident I had just taken a detour to avoid. I miss those old Esso roadmaps with the diabolical folds.

Over the past few months, there have been times when I've felt as though my GPS device was guiding us through our transition process. Usually, everything looks just fine, just as when my little electronic friend plots out my intersections, junctions, exits, entrances, and points of arrival. But other times – well, not so much. I just stare at the thing and say, "That can't be right." (She answers, "Did you say, 'Turn out the light'?") But we struggle along, following the instructions, and hope to all-get-out that we arrive with no major crises.

And we have nearly arrived. As of this writing, we are a few signatures away from having an interim priest, a person uniquely qualified to take over our leadership while we go about calling a new Rector. By faith we have made our way – not home, but to a new junction in our journey.

Next Step for the Capital Campaign – Reaching Out to the "Diaspora"

The Campaign for Trinity is a three-year capital campaign, launched last October, to raise \$750,000 to support much-needed campus repairs and improvements.

The first phase of the campaign has been soliciting donations from our current Trinity Church members. This phase is nearing completion and has

been very successful; so far, written pledges have been received for about 64% of the target amount, with verbal commitments for another 10% of the total. Thank you to our volunteer solicitors and to all those who've pledged their support! (If we haven't gotten to you yet, we will soon – but feel free to contact us if you haven't heard anything.)

The second phase of the campaign is now starting to take shape. This will be an outreach to former members of the church, particularly people who have moved away but who retain a personal connection to Trinity Church. We refer to these people as our "diaspora."

Father Bill Eakins, our Rector Emeritus, is serving as Chair of the Diaspora Committee, assisted by Liz Kirkpatrick, Kathie Wilson and others. This committee can use your help! Do you remember former parishioners who should be included in this outreach? Are you in touch with former members? The committee would appreciate receiving suggested names and, when possible, current addresses or other contact information. The third phase of the campaign will be outreach to the community and foundations. We very much appreciate everyone's efforts that are helping us achieve our goal. Thanks!

Trinity Offers Resting Place For Ashes from St. Mark's, New Britain, Memorial Garden

When the parish of St. Mark's, New Britain, recently moved from its former church building into a shared ministry space nearby, its members were faced with the question of what to do with the cremated remains of those who had been buried in its Memorial Garden. Knowing that Trinity Church, Hartford, had its own memorial garden, the leadership of St. Mark's asked if Trinity would accept a representative portion of the burial area at their former site for relocation to the Trinity garden. Trinity's Property Team and Vestry were happy to agree to this proposal, and the remains from St. Mark's have now been buried in our Memorial Garden alongside the ashes of Trinity's parishioners, family members and friends. The plaque listing the names of those who were buried at St. Mark's will be mounted in Trinity's Narthex, with the following wording added:

In the sure and certain Hope of the Resurrection

the cremated remains of the persons named on this plaque

were removed from the former site of

Saint Mark's Episcopal Church,

New Britain, Connecticut,

and were reinterred in the Memorial Garden of

Trinity Episcopal Church, Hartford,

on 20 June 2019

August Update – Sustaining Support for Diocese of Tabora

As you may remember, this summer we shared there was an urgent request for support from Bishop Chakupewa of Tabora, Tanzania, regarding their need for prayers and funds to support his people and clergy during the current drought and resultant food shortage. Trinity, with additional help from the Colin Fund, sent a donation to Tabora in July.

The amount provided to the Diocese represents approximately half of the current need, which hopes to bridge them over to the end of the current food shortage.

We are planning a parish Ingathering on October 13, during which we hope to raise additional funds for Tabora food aid. We would like to involve more parish members including the youth of the parish in this ongoing work, not only to respond to the immediate crisis, but also to sustain Trinity's longstanding relationship of support with Mbugani Parish and the Diocese of Tanzania.

Trinity Choirs To Sing for Christ Church Cathedral Centennial Evensong

On Saturday, October 26, the Trinity Choirs will join with the Choir of Christ Church Cathedral to sing a 6:30 p.m. service of Choral Evensong in celebration of

cathedral. For this service, the combined choirs will sing Phillip Radcliffe's Preces and Responses, Herbert Murrill's setting of the Magnificat and Nunc dimittis, and the beautiful "How lovely is thy dwelling place" from Johannes Brahms' Ein deutsches Requiem. The organist for the centennial Evensong will be the Rev. Benjamin Straley, former organist of the Washington National Cathedral: the Rt. Rev. Anne Dyer, Bishop of the Diocese of Aberdeen and Orkney, will preach.

This special service of Evensong is open to the public free of charge but, because it is a part of the 2019 Annual Convention of the Episcopal Church in Connecticut, those wishing to attend must register in advance at Eventbrite.com. Capital Project To Light Up Trinity Sanctuary

As the first of the projects being funded by our current Capital Campaign get underway, the Capital Works committee has been working with Clerk of the Works Dave Desmarais and Ray Christiansen, owner of Ray Lighting, to design a new lighting scheme for the sanctuary of the church. The old incandescent bulbs in our beautiful bronze chandeliers will be replaced with highly efficient LED lamps, not only saving money but also producing a brighter, more even "throw" from the fixture to the floor. However, lamps come in all different sizes, styles, intensities, and even colors - though some of these differences are quite subtle. Ray has been experimenting with various combinations to determine which will give the best light, in terms of both brightness and aesthetics.

Once the chandeliers are relamped, the spotlights that hang just beneath the clerestory windows (the ones high up near the ceiling) will be re-aimed. Instead of pointing downward to fill the dark spaces left by the present lighting arrangement, they will be replaced (again, with highefficiency LEDs) and aimed upwards toward the ceiling. This will have the effect of brightening the entire building, creating a sense of openness and light. This part of the project will be completed early this fall.

Plans are also underway to overhaul the lighting in the chancel, where many of the spotlights are not being used effectively. These will be replaced with smaller, brighter, better-focused instruments that will create a lighting "texture" to the chancel and add dramatic highlighting to important areas such as the pulpit, the lectern, and the altar.

The plan is to have the entire sanctuary lighting project completed by Advent. When it's finished, Trinity will have a much more welcoming look – and worshipers will not have to squint into their bulletins!
