When Should I Call the Pastor?

"Fr. Don, I hate to call you because I know you are so busy, but . . ."

I wouldn't be writing this particular column if I had not heard this comment three times in the last several weeks. On each occasion, the comment came from a faithful parishioner who was seeking pastoral advice

or intervention with respect to a personal situation. On each occasion I was saddened by the reluctance of the parishioner to call.

The fact of the matter is, yes, I am busy – so are most of us. And it is true that, like most people, pastors can fall victim to attending to matters that present themselves as "urgent" whether or not they are important or warrant attention at all. The flow of paper through an office somehow always seems to be urgent and to be sure, at some level, it is important. But it is NEVER more important than caring for and attending to the needs of parishioners and others who depend on the clergy for guidance or support. I can assure you that I didn't go to seminary to become an administrator. I

can also assure you that being with and serving the pastoral needs of members of the congregation is far more satisfying than a day of administrative work or meetings.

Ever since I have been at Trinity, we have published a list of times when parishioners *should* call the clergy. (It appears on our website on the Pastoral Care tab.) It is the highest privilege for me or any clergy to be involved in the events of parishioner' lives – whether joyful or sorrowful – and to minister in any way that is supportive of them. It is hard to do this if we are not aware of the situation. So I reprint that list below, meant only as examples and by no means as limitations.

As a way to get to know your clergy. The clergy appreciate the opportunity to get to know parishioners in their homes or workplaces. Invitations are welcome! Of course, parishioners are always welcome to meet with clergy in the parish offices as well. To assure that the clergy will be able to attend to your concerns with proper care, appointments are always suggested and appreciated.

When you have spiritual or moral questions, or questions about the Church and its teaching, or when you are faced with a difficult decision, the clergy stand as a source of guidance, acceptance and prayerful support.

If you wish to participate in the Rite of Reconciliation. The Book of Common Prayer provides an opportunity if you are troubled in conscience to confess your sins privately to "a discreet and understanding priest" in order that you "may receive the benefit of absolution, and spiritual counsel and advice . . . the

News from Trinity Academy

August 29 was the first day of school for Trinity Academy. We excitedly welcomed the inaugural 2nd grade class of eight students along with seventeen 4th graders, thirteen 3rd graders, one new teacher and support for the specials in Art, Yoga, Martial Arts, Physical Education and Library.

The first week of school we held a family breakfast, which was well attended. Before enjoying a delicious meal, Father Don offered a prayer to welcome Trinity's families, students and staff along with prayers for a successful school year filled with learning and emotional and spiritual growth. Parents expressed interest in starting a PTO. A PTO will help form a strong link in the important school and home connection.

We have started One School One Book where the whole school is reading as a COMMUNITY (one of our core values) The BFG by Roald Dahl. Introduced this year is Word of the Day. Every day a new word is presented to the whole school community. To reinforce the word, its meaning and usage will be discussed and the word used in the classroom and at specials. A list of the Words of the Day is included in the weekly newsletter. Families are encouraged to have the children share the definitions and use the words at home, supporting the link between school and home.

The students are growing academically as they enjoy their specials of Art, Yoga, Martial Arts, going to the library and gardening with the Knox Foundation. These

assurance of pardon, and the strengthening of your faith." If you seek sacramental forgiveness, you are urged to meet with the clergy. The seal of the confessional ensures confidentiality.

At the birth or adoption of a child. We want to rejoice with parents for the gift of creation of new life. Plans for the child's baptism can be discussed and, if desired, arrangements made for the rite of Thanksgiving for a Child.

When you are prevented from worshipping at church or suffering with chronic illness. Please call the office and a member of the clergy or a pastoral visitor will arrange a pastoral visit at your home.

When you are going to the hospital. When notified, the clergy visit area hospitals to offer prayers and to bring Holy Communion. If you are admitted to a hospital, please register as an Episcopalian and a member of Trinity Church in Hartford, and ask a friend or family member to contact the church as soon as possible. Be aware that present federal law prohibits hospitals and other health providers from releasing personal information unless you have authorized them to do so.

In case of pastoral emergency. In the case of any emergency situation where you desire the pastoral services of a priest, please call the main number at 860-527-8133 and notify the office staff or receptionist immediately. If the emergency occurs outside of normal office hours, select the "pastoral emergency" option on the voice mail and a member of the clergy will be notified as soon as possible.

These are just examples and not limitations. Yes, it is true that we have one priest on the staff for a large congregation. Please know that in addition to leading worship, pastoral care and relationships are additional primary responsibilities of parish clergy, and responsibilities that we cherish.

The Episcopal Church in Connecticut (ECCT) offers training on the prevention of abuse and exploitation of both children and adults for all lay ministers in positions of parish leadership, paid or volunteer. All lay persons are welcome and invited to attend these training sessions. This training is strongly encouraged for church school teachers and anyone who sees people in their homes on behalf of the church, e.g. Eucharistic Visitors or parish visitors, vestries and officers, and anyone who works with children and youth. A one-day Safe Church training workshop is offered for those who have never attended a training session in Connecticut; a 2 ½ hour refresher program is available for those who took the basic workshop more than three years ago. Special Educational Events

We've had a great response to some recent special events sponsored by the Adult Christian Formation Team. On the evening of September 28, more than thirty Trinity members gathered in Farmington for a special tour of the new Mormon Temple. Our guides were a local Mormon official and his wife, who spoke knowledgeably about the temple building and answered many questions we had about Mormonism. There are areas of overlap but also significant differences between the faith and practice of Mormons and those of Episcopalians, and the tour was a great chance to better understand a different religious tradition. If you missed the tour, you can arrange to join one of the public tours of the temple taking place between now and October 26, after which the building will no longer be open to the public.

On the evening of October 4, more than twenty-five people attended the first session of the "God, Faith and Politics" series at the Wood-n-Tap restaurant in Hartford. This session was on the topic of the role of the media in politics, and featured Trinity parishioner and Hartford Courant columnist Kevin Rennie along with his fellow Courant reporter John Lender.
