Life Together at Trinity

Be Not Afraid

As we approach the season of Advent, this is the message we all need to hear. It is one raised up by our Presiding Bishop in a recent message: BE NOT AFRAID. It is a profound message for Advent 2015.

The words "fear" and "afraid" appear hundreds of times in the Hebrew and Christian scriptures. One of the most well-known of these is in Luke 2:10: In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for see – I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people...'

This is a familiar Biblical pattern: God's people are facing an unfamiliar, unexpected, unknown, threatening or even terrifying situation. They don't know what to do. God or a divine representative makes an appearance. And among their first words are some version of, *Do not be afraid*. They are words of comfort and reassurance as the human witnesses learn of some great event that God has made possible.

And so it is for us today. In recent weeks we have witnessed a passenger jet liner explode in mid-air over Egypt as the result of a bomb contained in what appeared to be a beverage can. We have witnessed the ability of a handful of well-organized extremists to orchestrate synchronized mass murder at multiple venues in Paris. With respect to these events, Bishop Curry writes:

In times like this fear is real. And I share that fear with you. Our instinct tells us to be afraid. The fight-or-flight mentality takes hold. At the present moment, many across our Church and our world are grasped by fear in response to the terrorist attacks that unfolded in Paris last Friday. These fears are not unfounded... And yet, especially when we feel legitimate fear, our faith reminds us "Be not afraid." The larger truth is that our ultimate security comes from God in Christ.

As it was for those shepherds, so it is for us – especially we who are accustomed to believing that we are in control of our own situations. Advent is the season of hopeful expectation, leading us to the glory and the joy of Jesus' birth. The shepherds went with the angel's assurance to check out the unknown situation that was waiting for them in a stable in Bethlehem. God invites us this Advent not to shrink with fear, but to follow faithfully where Jesus leads us, even in the midst of unfamiliar, unexpected, unknown,

December 6 & 13 – Finding Bethlehem in the Midst of Bedlam Led by: Dante Tavolaro

Join our seminarian, Dante Tavolaro, in an exploration of James W. Moore's *Finding Bethlehem in the Midst of Bedlam: An Advent Study*. Cathedral To Honor Deacon Richey at Service of Lessons & Carols

On Sunday, December 6, Christ Church Cathedral will offer a 3:00 p.m. Service of Lessons and Carols, a traditional Anglican service which celebrates the birth of Jesus through Bible readings interspersed with music of the holiday season. This year's service is a special one, as it is being planned in honor of the Reverend Donald Richey, who is retiring. Since 2012, Deacon Richey has served as the Deacon for Church by the Pond, which offers an outdoor service of Holy Eucharist in Bushnell Park every Saturday afternoon followed by the distribution of bag lunches to people in need. (Trinity is one of the many churches who participate regularly in the Church by the Pond ministry.)

Everyone is invited to come to the Cathedral on the 6th to enjoy the beautiful music and honor Deacon Richey for his years of ministry. A reception will follow the service.

No Evensong at Trinity in December or January

Since a number of our members are regular participants in the Church by the Pond ministry, Trinity has cancelled its first-Sunday-of-themonth service of Evensong for December so that everyone can attend the December 6 service of Lessons and Carols at the Cathedral in honor of Church by the Pond's retiring Deacon Richey (see article above). There will be no service of Evensong in January; our 2015-2016 Evensong series will resume on February 7.

From the Annual Appeal Team

Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received.

1 Peter 4:10

This year the Annual Appeal team decided to visually highlight and celebrate the work we do at Trinity. On each of three Sundays we presented a slide show highlighting a key aspect of our life together. The first presentation dealt with worship, the second with Music and Arts, and the third with Outreach to the community. Each slide show presented a vivid reminder of the many gifts we enjoy here at Trinity and the many ways we use these gifts to praise God and to serve others.

Trinity is a vital and vibrant part of the Hartford community and, given the many gifts that we have received, our grateful response must be to continue to praise God and to offer ourselves to be used by the Holy Spirit to bless our community.

For some time now, we have been aware that due to our increased dependence on the Trinity endowment to fund operations, the endowment is quickly being eroded. Currently the endowment funds approximately 36% of the operating budget. While it is true that at our current rate of usage, the endowment will be depleted in a couple of years, it is not true that Trinity Church must then close its doors. We can continue to do the great work shown in our slide show presentations if we reduce our dependence on the endowment and, by faith, become a more fully member-supported church.

At Trinity we practice proportional giving as a means of working our way to the church's minimum standard of giving, which is the tithe. In proportional giving we give a proportion of our income to support the work of the church. In order to reduce our dependence on the endowment, each of us must prayerfully review where we are on this journey and consider how we can, over time, increase our proportionate giving.

This year the Annual Appeal team is asking that, as we review our financial support to Trinity Church, we consider increasing our gift by 1% of our income. This level of giving would significantly reduce the endowment's support of operations. In this way, in a few years our endowment usage could be down to about 5% where financial planners recommend it should be in order to extend the life of the endowment and allow it to grow.

Estimate of Giving and related materials have already been mailed out with the annual in-gathering scheduled for Sunday, November 22. Prayerfully consider your level of giving for the coming year and bring your completed Estimate of Giving card to church on November 22. If you cannot attend services on the 22nd, you are urged to mail your card to the church office in the pre-addressed envelope included with the mailing.

Please join us in responding faithfully to God's call to us to spread the good news of Jesus' love.

Foyer Groups – A Pledge of Community

Comfort Cross Sale To Benefit Syrian Refugees

After both services on Sunday, November 29, the Outreach Team will be selling comfort crosses in Goodwin Hall. The crosses, just under 4" in length, are meant to be held in the hand during prayer or meditation or any other time, such as during illness or anxious times. Made of olive wood grown in Palestine and crafted at a workshop in Bethlehem, they are beautiful to the eye and the touch.

The crosses cost \$6 each, and proceeds will be donated to Syrian refugee humanitarian relief. You can pay for your cross by cash or check; checks should be made payable to Trinity Church, with "Syrian refugees" in the memo line.

Giving Tree To Debut November 29

Our 2015 Giving Tree will make its debut in the Baptistery for our services on the First Sunday of

Advent, November 29. The tree will be decorated with its customary collection of colorful tags listing the wishes of Hartford

area children, some of whom attend Trinity Academy. These children all need our help to make their wishes come true.

To fulfill a wish, take a tag from the tree, write your name and phone number on the top, and leave that part of the tag in the basket provided. Keep the bottom portion, which lists the child's name, age, gender, and holiday wish. Purchase the item, then return your wrapped gift to the Baptistery with the tag attached (so we know which child it's for) by Sunday, December 13. Lakesha Ruth, our Covenant to Care social worker, will collect the gifts and make sure they are delivered to their intended recipients in time for the holidays.

Please consider taking one of the tags from the tree, and fulfilling a child's special Christmas wish. (If the cost of granting a wish is more than you can manage all on your own, consider joining up with another Trinity parishioner to share the cost of being a Christmas elf.)

A Season of Presence

The Outreach Team has designated this Advent as a Season of Presence. On November 22, vou will be provided a calendar to mark the days of Advent (which begins November 29) with ideas of how you may be present to the world around you. Each day, select a way to serve those hurting, in need of help, lonely or ill, or another example of loving your neighbor. Record your actions on the calendar, marking the days till God is present among us in Jesus' birth. After Christmas, reflect on what you have recorded and how God's presence is felt via your service.

Fresh Start Program Takes Up Residence In Trinity Catacombs

As of November 15, Trinity Episcopal Church is the temporary winter home of Fresh Start Pallet Products, LLC, an Asylum Hillbased micro-business that was the brainchild of Pastor Rick Kremer at Grace Lutheran Church.

Fresh Start Pallet Products takes cast-off delivery pallets which would otherwise wind up in landfills and repurposes them, utilizing their component parts to create indoor and outdoor furniture. The exciting part is that the furniture is created by workers who were previously unemployed and have now been trained to produce the finished products.

As the project got started earlier this year, the furniture was being produced in the back yard of Grace Lutheran under the protection of a canopy. With the onset of winter weather, the business was facing shutdown due to delay in moving into space belonging to the State of Connecticut. That's when Fr. Don, who is a member of the Fresh Start Steering Committee, offered the Trinity Catacombs as a quick and available alternative.

Lee Whittemore, a member at Grace and on-site supervisor of the work, says, "It's not ideal, but it works for us and keeps us going through the winter." With the addition of some lighting and ventilation, the crew of four has set up a production line and picked up production where they left off on November 12.

Fresh Start plans to remain at Trinity until their new and permanent facilities are ready sometime in spring 2016.

An Update on Trinity Academy Autumn Activities

The start of school seems long past, and we have been working



well with our students. We have just accepted our 17th fourth grader, who started this week. He lives in Berlin and

was being bullied at his mostly white school.

We completed testing each student's reading level (DRA score) and found that while many students are on grade level or above with this indicator, many are also having difficulty comprehending what they are reading. Thus, especially for our 4th graders we are focusing on building reading comprehension and the ability to summarize what they have read.

Math testing for the third graders has been completed, and shows (no surprise) that half the class is behind (same as reading/writing). We are focusing on specific math skill areas in both grades.

We are blessed with lots of volunteers, especially in third grade, and can use even more, both to read with students and assist in class. Some students need much better focus in class in order to learn. We have established a relationship with Wheeler Clinic and have had appointments for two families with more to come.

Fourth grade students visited the Big E and even learned a few things about states and animals. Teacher Josh Krause and Principal Jen Canzano prepared very good introductions to the states and follow-up quizzes. We have used "Jeopardy" for building retention and it is working; many students

knew about states across the country.

Stephen Ministry Expands with Friendly Caller/Friendly Visitor Programs

Trinity's Pastoral Care ministries are expanding to reach out to more parishioners.

For several years now, Trinity Episcopal Church has been a Stephen Ministry parish, part of a world-wide Christian Caring ministry comprised of more than 10,000 participating parishes. Trained Stephen Ministers receive more than 50 hours of training before being assigned in a one-onone relationship to a care receiver who is facing some personal crisis. These relationships typically last a year or less, during which time the Stephen Minister visits on a regular basis to provide spiritual support to the care receiver.

Starting in Mid-November, Trinity's Pastoral Care ministries will be reaching out more intentionally to parishioners who may not be suffering a crisis situation but who may be experiencing loneliness or a sense of isolation, particularly if it is difficult for them to get around. With the guidance of Fr. Don and organized by Seminarian Dante Tavolaro, two Trinity parishioners will be reaching out to these parishioners.

John Hinkston, who is a nurse by training, will be leading a phone outreach ministry, reaching out to parishioners who have not been seen in a while. He will be calling to check in about their general

welfare, and ask if they would like a ride to church or a pastoral visit, want to be placed on the home Communion list, or have other similar pastoral concerns. Dianne Bowens-Waller, another Trinity parishioner who has received Stephen Ministry training, will be serving as a "friendly visitor," following up on those parishioners who have expressed a desire for an occasional visit to provide companionship and support.

If you are contacted by John or Dianne, please welcome them as an extension of Fr. Don's pastoral ministry and the other parish care ministries of Trinity Episcopal Church.

Interfaith Basketball League Looking for Players

Christmas Memorials

Notes from Recent Vestry Meetings

October:

The Vestry met on October 20 for a leadership development session focusing on the Feasibility Study from Partners for Sacred Places. Leadership Development meetings always feature an abbreviated business session including approval of the minutes of the previous meeting, feedback from the congregation, and reports from the Wardens and clergy.

Following approval of the September minutes, Vestry members provided positive feedback regarding the St. Francis Day blessing of the animals in Sigourney Square Park held on October 3 and the Blessing of the Animals during both services at Trinity on Sunday, October 4. The Vestry acknowledged April Alford-Harkey and Deacon Bonnie for organizing these events and thanked Melzen Farm Supply in Glastonbury for donating all of the animal treats for both days.

Members also commented with enthusiasm about the music on the day of Bishop Chakupewa's visit. It was suggested that we try to incorporate more African music into our services. People also commented that they missed the organ on the recent Sunday when its electrical circuitry had a last-minute failure.

The wardens reported on coordination between Trinity Academy and the Choir School and encouraged participation in the Choir School's Emerald Ball on November 5. Fr. Don reported that Peter Emmanuel was no longer serving as Sexton and that he is

investigating a more viable way of managing and caring for Trinity's buildings and grounds than the traditional position of sexton. Fr. Don also reported that an Ethiopian Orthodox congregation may be interested in worshipping at Trinity and, after discussion, a show of hands indicated overwhelming support for this proposal, with approval for a three-month trial period.

The remainder of the meeting centered around discussion of the highlights of the Partners for Sacred Places Feasibility Study. The meeting was adjourned at 9:06 p.m. following closing prayers by Fr. Don.

November:

The November 17 Vestry meeting was entirely devoted to the Trinity budget. Beginning at 6:00 p.m. instead of the usual 7:15 starting time, the Vestry was joined by several parishioners and by Finance Manager Fran Times-Mack and Precentor Bert Landman, who presented his requested music budget. The Vestry went through each line item in the budget, with the exception of personnel, to review historical costs and projected expenses for the coming year, and to consider where adjustments should be made.

Following this process, there followed extensive discussion, led by Fr. Don, about the impact that resolutions of Diocesan Convention will have on Trinity in the coming year. Specifically, there are two that we must consider:

1) A resolution passed in 2013 that requires a

- minimum pledge to the diocese of 10% of each parish's operating expenditures for the previous year.
- 2) A second resolution, originally passed in 2014 but then modified just this month, which requires endowed parishes to spend less than 25% of the average book value of their endowment over a three-year period, beginning in 2016.

The penalty for violating these rules is that the Diocese is then authorized to assume control of the parish endowment and distribute an industry-standard 4 % to 5% annually. In addition, the noncompliant parish can be considered an "aided parish," which negatively impacts the parish's ability to govern itself.

Fr. Don offered to meet with the Executive Committee and develop two different budget scenarios for 2016: one that would represent all of the budget requests for the coming year, and a second budget that would be compliant with both of the Convention resolutions. The budgets will be presented and voted on at the Vestry meeting on December 15.

Asylum Hill Neighborhood Association (AHNA) – Recent News and Events

Police Report:

There have been no big changes up or down, with the most criminal activity involving burglaries and car break-ins. Any comments about panhandlers at the Sigourney Street I-84 highway off-ramp should be sent to the Hartford Police Community Service Officer, Chris Chanaca, at chanc002@hartford.gov.

Habitat for Humanity:

This organization conducted over 70 interviews with S. Marshall Street residents regarding the quality of life in the neighborhood and support for a possible community playground.

Education Committee:

This group is putting together data on educational opportunities on Asylum Hill. AHNA will publicize the resulting list.

OPPortunity Academy:

This program for students who are over-age and under-credited opened in August with 160 students. The Academy is operated by OPP (Our Piece of the Pie), a nonprofit with experience in running two schools for this school population. This past summer, 650 youth were placed in internship positions; so far, 52 of them have been hired post-internship.

Early Development Instrument:

Catholic Charities explained this as a means of learning how well children are prepared for kindergarten. It helps to identify if children are entering school on track, at risk, or vulnerable in such areas as communication, social and emotional skills, physical health and education.

A Thank You from The Hartford:

The insurance company offered their thanks for residents' cooperation during the company's recent construction of a parking garage, which has now been completed. The company has commissioned a 30' by 22' work from artist Georges Annan-Kingsley (a Trinity parishioner); a model of the project, which will hang on the outside wall of the new garage, was displayed at the meeting.

Hartford Decides:

Funding is available from this participatory budgeting program for capital improvements and durable goods within the city. Hartford residents vote on the projects, and those chosen will be funded. This is a collaboration among the City of Hartford, the Hartford Public Library, Leadership Greater Hartford, MetroAlliance and Hartford 2000. More information is available at www.asylumhill.org.
